Meeting of Military Surgeons.

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 25.—About the corridors and lobbies of the Hotel Cadillac today were to be seen many gray haired men of military bearing, all uniformed and wearing shoulder straps of gold braid, many with decorations upon their coats that tell of service and honorable achievements in actual warfare on land and sea. These are members of the Association of Military Surgeons of the United States, whose fourteenth annual meeting will be in session here during the next three days, beginning with a meeting of the executive council tonight.

The officers of the association who will have charge of the meeting are: President, Surgeon General Walter Wyman, Washington, D. C.; first vice president, Major Albert H. Briggs, of the New York National Guard; second vice president, Brigadier-General Albert M. O'Reilly, U. S. A.; third vice president, Rear Admiral Presley M. Rixey, U. S. N.; secretary, Major James Evelyn Plicher, Carlisle, Pa., and treasurer, Major Herbert A. Arnold, of the Pennsylvania National Guard.

One of the most distinguished of today's arrivals was Dr. S. Suzuki, chief surgeon of the Japanese army, who was sent by the Japanese government to attend the convention. Dr. Suzuki was the companion of Admiral Togo throughout the recent war.

Colorado Club Women.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 25.—The Colorado Federation of Women's Clubs holds its annual convention in Denver this week and many delegates are already here. The large number of early arrivals indicates an unusual degree of interest, aroused in part by the election of officers and partly by the importance of the subjects scheduled for discussion. "By the Light of the Past to Unravel the Future" has been selected as the convention theme. The local club women have arranged many social features for the entertainment of the visitors.

Bright Outlook for Earlham.

Richmond, Ind., Sept. 25.—Earlham college opened for the fall term today, a week later than usual. The coming year promises to be the most prosperous that the Quaker institution has ever enjoyed, the registration being unusually large. More attention is to be given this year to physical culture and athletics than ever before, this phase of college life having been made a part of the curriculum.

Fay Templeton's New Play.

Columbus, O., Sept. 25.—A number of visitors from out of town are here to attend the premiere tonight of Fay Templeton's new musical play, "Forty-five Minutes from Broadway," which is to be produced at the Great Southern theater. The piece was written by George M. Cohan. After brief engagements at Toledo, Dayton and Indianapolis the play will be put on for a run at the Colonial theater in Chicago.

Theatrical Openings.

New York, Sept. 25.—The chief events of the week in metropolitan theatrical circles are the opening of the New Montauk theater in Brooklyn tonight, and the initial production of George Ade's new comedy, "Just Out of College," at the Lyceum theater. The Ade comedy is to be produced tonight with Joseph Wheelock, Jr., in the principle role.

New Orleans Defers School Opening.

New Orleans, La., Sept. 25.—Owing to the continued prevalence of the yellow fever epidemic all the city's public schools, which were to have opened today, will remain closed for two weeks more, by which time it is expected that cooler weather will have lessened the danger of infection.
