## Two Interesting Cases.

Two prominent Salem cases have set for hearing before the supreme court Tuesday, October 17th. They are Sprague vs. Jessup, involving the possession of the Jessup property on State street, just east of the Salem hotel, and Livesley vs. Litchfield. The latter is the famous election case, and the question involved is the validity of the city ordinance which states that no citizen can vote at a city election who has not paid his poll tax.

At the last city election Litchfield, as one of the judges, with other election officials, refused to permit Livesley to vote, on the ground that he had not paid his poll tax. He brought suit for damages and the case has been carried up through the justice and circuit courts. So far the city has had the best of the decisions, and the outcome is awaited with a great deal of interest.

Other cases have been set for hearing as follows:

October 18—Gerald vs. Marshall; Seed vs. Jennings.

October 19—Marks vs. Moores.

## NUTMEG POLITICAL MEETING

## Republicans Hold Convention in Boston, Senator Lodge Presiding

Boston, Mass., Oct. 6.—With Senator Lodge in control it is safe to say that today's Republican state convention will adopt no radical resolutions in regard to tariff revision. The convention was called to order in Tremont Temple at 10 o'clock and the forenoon was taken up with the roll call, the opening addresses and appointment of the necessary committees. At noon an adjournment was taken to give the committees time to prepare their reports.

It is the prevailing belief that the tariff plank as recommended by the committee on resolutions will declare in a general way for a revision of the tariff by a Republican congress without specifying any articles on which the tariff must be revised. The plank for free hides, iron ore, coal, lumber and wood pulp, as put out by the committee of 100 on reciprocal trade, will not in all probability be incorporated in the platform, though its supporters have announced their intention of making a fight for it on the convention floor. The "stand-patters" may consent to some reference to the dual tariff scheme, coupled with the suggestion that the maximum and minimum be fixed by congress, but it is safe to say that the platform will not advocate taking the present Dingley tariff as the maximum, that being the course advised by Eugene F. Foss, and other reciprocity leaders.

There is no opposition to the nomination of Lieutenant-Governor Curtis Guild, Jr., for governor and he will be named by acclamation. Eben S. Draper, brother of Gen. William P. Draper, formerly ambassador to Italy, will be named lieutenant-governor.

Curtis Guild, Jr., the Republican nominee for governor of Massachusetts, was born in Boston February 2, 1860, and was graduated from Harvard with the highest honors in 1881. His entrance into politics was as a delegate at large from Massachusetts to the Republican national convention in 1896, and in the campaign of that year he was active as a speaker in New England, the Central West and Southern States. He enlisted at the outbreak of the Spanish war and served on the staff of General Fitzhugh Lee until the break up of the Seventh Corps in Cuba. After the war he was offered a colonial commission and later the post of first assistant postmaster-general, both of which he declined. He has served three terms as lieutenant-governor of Massachusetts.

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always been at work in such a way as to produce the greatest possible effect, then we should find that 60,000,000 years would be consumed in this portion of evolutionary history. The true period must be much greater, and it does not seem unreasonable to suppose that 500,000,000 to 1,000,000,000 years may have elapsed since the birth of the moon.

## Power of Niagara.

The Niagara river descends 100 feet and develops 2,500,000 horse-power between the base of the great escarpment and the foot of the escarpment at Lewistown and Queenstown, five miles down stream. This energy represented by the normal discharge of 232,000 cubic feet of water per second, is now expended, says the Architect and Builder, in excavating the great gorge in which the White Horse rapids, the Whirlpool and Niagara rapids are located. Fully eighty feet of this fall along the rapids occurs between a point several hundred feet south of the cantilever bridge and another at the lower end of the gorge, which can be connected by a tunnel some 10,000 feet long, on the New York side of the river. With the head of eighty feet and the discharge of 232,000 cubic feet per second named above these rapids thus develop 2,000,000 horse-power, as mechanical motion and heat. This power is fully one-half as great as that of the American and Horseshoe falls combined, since the volume of water is substantially the same in the falls and the rapids, and the descent of the former is only twice that of the latter. Making the fair assumption that 60 per cent of the gross energy of the water of these rapids can be transformed into electric current, the output of plants utilizing the entire flow would reach 1,200,000 horse-power. This capacity is nearly double that of the six great electric power

stations that are now in various stages of completion about Niagara Falls, three on the New York and three on the Canadian side of the river.

In making buttonholes, if the material is of the kind which frays easily, like voile, for example, first mark the hole, and before cutting stitch it on the sewing machine and cut between the two rows of stitching. This not only makes a firm foundation for the embroidery, but effectually prevents the material from "frazzling."
