WIND ON A FROLIC.

Blow Down Wires and Had a Fireworks of Its Own.

During the early hours of this morning a wind storm of considerable force played havoc in a small way with electric wires, clothes lines, fruit trees and other perishable utilities. The storm was quite general throughout the Northwest, and has proven a serious drawback to the telegraph wires. This, in a measure, accounts for the meagre reports sent in by telegraph today.

In Salem the storm was marked, and as a result the electric "linemen" and "busy men" of the telephone company are chuck full of business. Mr. Daney has had a large crew working busily since daylight, connecting up the breaks and making every possible effort to satisfy the disconnected customers. The electric light people also had their crew out, making similar repairs all over the city. In East Salem there was one fatality as the result of the storm. A cat was killed on Court street, but the company feel undisturbed about that, as they claim the animal still has eight lives to spare, and will show up all right.

Up on Cottage street there was a magnificent pyrotechnic display on the alley in Jerry Wyant's poultry park. A live wire came down, falling onto the wire netting, as well as over a pile of old baling and barbed fence wire. The whole mass of metal was charged with electricity. It set the chicken house on fire, but Jerry did not care to turn the water on the flames. The neighbors all enjoyed the magnificent lights produced by the cross-currents, and all were wise enough to keep hands off until the electricians appeared and relieved the situation. It is not learned that any great damage has been done, but many little inconveniences have resulted, which are being rapidly remedied.

HOPS BEING STORED

Failure to Sell Last Year, at 30 Cents Hurt Prices This Year

Since hop picking is practically over and hundreds of bales are being brought to the city almost daily for storage, there begins to be a prospect that there will soon be a market for the crop. No sales of new hops have as yet been positively been reported, and very few of the old hops are moving. Among the sales of the latter reported are those of Smith Stevens and Mr. Rogers, of Hopewell, Yamhill county, who sold at 12 1/4 cents per pound.

Conservative growers about Salem, men of means, who are not indebted on their crop, as a rule seem willing to sell at 15 cents. One of this class has a contract for four years at 13 1/2c. He hopes to see that price exceeded this year, but feels satisfied that he has a satisfactory contract. The fact that many growers lost so heavily on last year's crop is making growers discriminating in their movements, and, while it was an expensive process, it has had a good educational effect. One capitalist grower now says that the holding of last year's crop was a mistake, and that if the growers had unloaded on the buyers the latter would have been compelled to maintain prices, and that, as a result, this year's crop would bring over 25 to 50 per cent more money. The tendency just at present seems to be for less speculation and more staple business.

Representative Champ Clark tells of an amusing story in connection with the inauguration of Thomas T. Crittenden as governor of Missouri, a ceremony attended with more frolic than any other in the state since the civil war.

According to Mr. Clark, there was on this occasion military organizations and bands galore, and special loads of people came from Kansas City and St. Louis to witness the pageant.
