STORY OF THE CHAPERONS

The most notable musical event of
the current season, will be the appear-
ance of the big musical organization
presenting "The Chaperons," Isidore
Witmark's and Frederic Ran-
kin's charming operatic comedy at the
Grand Opera House tomorrow, Sat-
urday, night. This excellent comedy-
opera has had three highly successful
seasons, having played the principal
cities throughout the country and is
now in its fourth, with a company in-
cluding many of the original members
and some new talent that scarcely
needs any introduction. The produc-
tion is new throughout and the most
costly yet accorded the piece. The
scenery is new, the costumes are new
and all the properties and mechanical
and electrical effects. The principal
comedy role will be in the hands of
Frank Woolley, who will be assisted
by that very commendable character
actor and singer, John Price. Made-
lyn Marshall, a soubrette of much rep-
utation and a rollicking singer and
dancer, will have the role of the fe-
male detective, Phrosia. Ruth Lloyd
will again shine as the chaperone.
There is a chorus of forty and a stun-
ning collection of Show Girls. The
story of "The Chaperons" is so well
known that it is hardly necessary to
give more than an outline, in fact, it
is of little importance anyway. It re-

Hogg, a New York subway contractor,
who has gone to Paris in search of

is a busy old soul, and, as a member

do Paris in his official capacity. In
his search for his lost ward and seal
he falls into the hands of a profes-
sional chaperon, an opera impresario
and a number of other grafters, who
proceed to show him the town in the
most improved and up-to-date manner.
The long lost ward is found wandering
around Paris, being one of the spear-
carriers in chaperon emporium. She,
of course, has a lover who has also
been lost but turns up in the nick of
time, much to the disgust of the guar-
dian, who orders the girl back home
and incorporates himself as the angel
of an opera company in order to get
rid of the lover. The first town that
the company plays is Alexandria,
Egypt, where it presently becomes
stranded. The ward has followed her
baritone lover there, and the girl de-
fective is also on deck looking for a
seal, but hers is of the fur species.
Thanks to the good-natured guardian
and his pathetic pocket-book all the
difficulties are adjusted. The two
seals are found, the girl gets the bar-
itone, the guardian gets the chaperon
and they all go back to the Bois de
Bologne. The music of the piece is
exceptionally pretty and tuneful and
there are at least a dozen numbers
that have become tremendously popu-
lar, among the better known may be
mentioned, "He Winked At Me,"
"We're All Good Fellows," "Talk,
Talk, Talk," "Billy's Very Good to
Me," "When I Sang My Low 'C,'" "In
My Official Capacity," "Love In
a Palace Is Better," "My Sambo,"
"The Little Maid Who Couldn't Say
No," "A Most Accommodating
Chaperon," "Just a Gentle Touch,"
and "It Seems Like Yesterday." Other
prominent members of the com-
pany are Harry Ladell, George Ly-
decker and W. V. Strantz.

Killed by Live Wire.

While assisting in the rescue of her
13-year-old son, who had been rendered
unconscious by an electric shock, Mrs.
Mary Jane Price, a well-known resi-
dent of Butte, Montana, was electro-
cuted Wednesday. The boy was seri-
ously burned, but he is expected to
recover. Samuel Price, husband of the
deceased woman, suffered a severe
shock while dragging the boy's body
from the wire, and Arthur Merrick was
knocked down by the current of elec-
tricity, while attempting to rescue
Mrs. Price and was seriously burned.

The children were playing about the
yard during the afternoon, and had
hooked a section of baling wire over a
feed wire carrying 2200 volts. The wire
is used to feed are lights, and the pow-
er was not turned on until a short time
before the accident. The boys had
played with the dangling lengths of
wire during the daytime.
