St. Petersburg, Oct. 6.—Now that hostilities have ceased between Russia and Japan, people in St. Petersburg and other Russian cities are asking what will be done with the men and women who, during the last few months, prophesied the near approach

of peace and were sent to Siberia for their pains.

BANKERS TO MEET

Washington, D. C., Oct. 6.—Bankers from every state and territory, from country banks, from town banks, from state banks and national banks, from private banks and trust companies—bankers representing an aggregate capital exceeding twelve million dollars will gather in Washington next week for the annual meeting of the American Bankers' Association. The meeting promises to be the most notable in the history of the association.

The business meetings of the association will be held in the National theater. The two sections relating to savings banks and trust companies will have their meetings at the New Willard and Shoreham hotels, respectively. The chief addresses before the general association, in addition to the annual address of President E. F. Swinney, of Kansas City, will be delivered by Frank A. Vanderlip, vice-president of the City National Bank of New York; William B. Ridgely, former controller of the currency, and Secretary of the Treasury, Leslie M. Shaw.

Chicago, Oct. 6.—A jury has been impaneled to hold an inquest on the girl who died of morphine at the home of Dr. Hart. Hart has partially recovered. JACKSON COUNTY VALUED HIGH

County Assessor Raises From \$4,000,000 to \$13,000,000, or Actual Worth.

Jacksonville, Or., Oct. 6.—The Jackson county board of equalization, consisting of Judge Dunn, Assessor Applegate and Clerk Orth, is considering the radical change made this year by the assessor in more than trebling the assessment of last year, and raising valuations to something near the commercial worth of the property.

The assessment for 1904 for the county was approximately \$4,000,000, while the valuation this year is in excess of \$13,000,000, an increase of 3 1/4 times that of last year. Timber lands throughout the county have been raised from about \$2 to \$10 and \$12 per acre. The roadbed of the Southern Pacific, assessed last year for \$5200 per mile, is this year placed at \$20,000 per mile, and the lands of the company have been raised proportionately with those of private individuals.

A Bold Negro Thief.

New York, Oct. 6.—A daring daylight attempt to steal \$30,000 worth of jewels from a Maiden Lane jewelry store was made yesterday, and a clerk, who defended the treasure, was stabbed. The robber was Louis Brown, a negro, who walked in the front door of the store of Cross & Bequelin and jumped over a railing to a show window, where he picked up a tray containing \$30,000 worth of precious stones.

Oscar Windorf, a clerk, shouted at the negro, who dropped the jewels and started for the door. The clerk chased him into the street. There the negro turned on his pursuer and stabbed him. He was not badly hurt.

Forethought in Birds.

The following bird story comes from a high church dignitary of North Wales. Close by his rectory is a large rookery. Twice a year the birds assemble and repair or rebuild their nests. At these times the ground beneath the trees is more or less thickly strewn with small potatoes. This mysterious phenomenon was finally explained by an old parishioner. The rooks use the potatoes for measuring the insides of their nests. When compared with a rook's egg the potatoes were found to closely coincide with the former both in length and breadth. After using the potatoes for purposes of measurement the rooks never eat them or carry them away and they accumulate in considerable numbers beneath the trees.

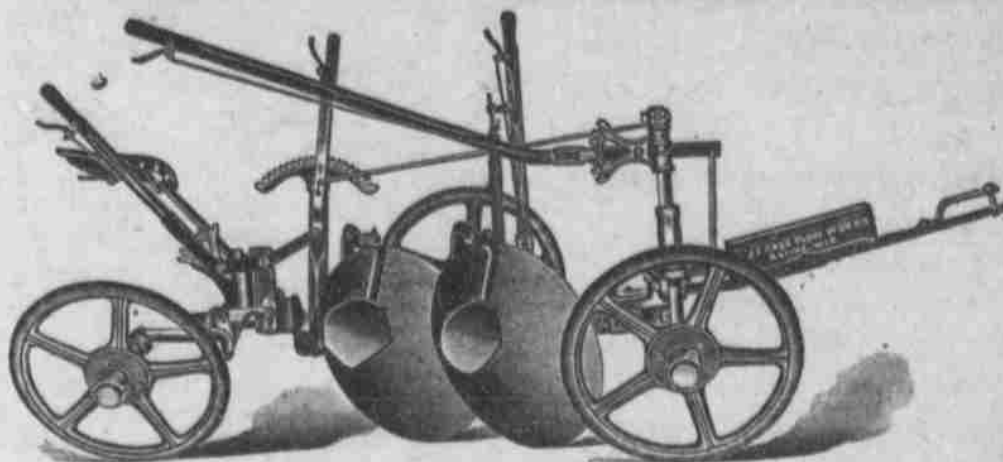

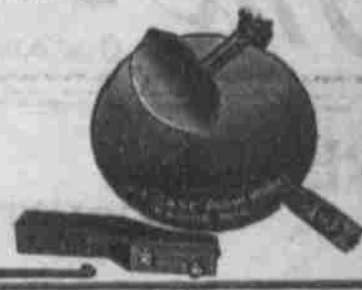
The illustration above shows the Gang as it is made for this season's trade and from the flattering reports received of it, from those who have used it, we are convinced it is much superior to others.
