BANKERS WANT SUBSIDY

Resolutions Rather Premature About the Panama Canal Traffic

Washington, D. C., Oct. 12.—Resolutions specifically indorsing the ship subsidy bill were adopted by the American Bankers' association today. The influence of the association toward congressional action was pledged for the rejuvenation of American shipping. It points out that upon the construction of the Panama canal American interests will be poorly equipped to benefit by it. A resolution that a respectable merchant marine be established to carry American goods by the canal on American ships was adopted by an overwhelming majority.

The convention received the report of the resolutions committee. It endorses the president's fight for the enforcement of laws and civic righteousness; favors a deeper channel in the Columbia and harbor improvements. It indorses the direct nomination at the primaries and demands a fair trial for the new law. It pledges candidates not receiving a plurality vote to support the ticket. The railroad rate law resolution was tabled. Jones, of Lincoln, is making a fight on the floor of the convention for open harbors on the west coast. The committee refused to consider a resolution opposing minority representation.
