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**New Law Hits Mines.**  
Scranton, Pa. Oct. 14.—The new child labor law, which is to become effective tomorrow, will vigorously opposed by the mine operators of this district. No opposition has arisen to the law's provision which raises the age limit to 14 years for outside work, and 16 years for inside work. The clause which hits the coal operators hard is that which says that no one under 21 years of age will be permitted to work in or around a mine who cannot pass an educational test in the common English branches. As a large percentage of the boys employed around the mines are of foreign birth or parentage, most of them would be barred from employment if the new law is strictly enforced.

**Bakers and Confectioners.**  
New York, Oct. 14.—Many delegates are on hand from the United States and Canada for the 12th annual convention of the Bakers and Confectioners' International Union, which will be in session here during the coming week. Several matters of importance are to come up for consideration and decision. A proposition for withdrawal from the American Federation of Labor will be brought up, but it is

probable that a decision in the negative will be reached. One of the important changes to be made at the convention is the establishment of a compulsory benefit system.  
**To Hold Big Wolf Chase.**  
Ardmore, I. T., Oct. 14.—A dispatch from Paul's Valley says that arrangements have been made for a big wolf round-up near Table Mountain, beginning tomorrow. The hunt will be a three days affair. The chase will be led by Captain Tom Shannon, one of the oldest hunters of the Chickasaw nation, and who recently located a den of looper wolves some of them, it is said, as large as full-grown St. Bernard dog.

**Sixty-Eight New Rhodes Scholars.**  
London, Oct. 14.—Sixty-eight Rhodes scholars, comprising the new contingent for this year, took up their residence at Oxford today. Of this number, the United States sent 38. Every state sent candidates with the exception of Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah and Wyoming. All the Canadian provinces are represented with the exception of the Northwest territory. Including those who entered last year the total number of Rhodes scholars now at Oxford is 147.
