## HOPS ARE LOW BUT FIRM

### Business is Lively and Many Crops Have Already Changed Hands

The hop market which lay in a torpid condition a good part of last week, has awakened and is bestirring itself. Buyers are surprised at the firmness it manifests. Prices are unwavering, holding steadily at 12 1/2 cents, though one or two sales are rumored to have been made at the season's opening price, 13 cents.

Local buyers have taken in a total of 1,500 bales since Saturday morning, making the buying the liveliest of the season.

S. Harris, local agent of Schwartz & Co., has made buys not previously announced, amounting to 800 bales. Prices were at 12 1/2 and 13 cents. The Steele and Hanson crop from Buena Vista, 212 bales, were taken at 12 1/2 cents. Other buys were made on the West Side.

A choice lot of hops was bought by Cullin & Linn from Jake Smith, of Polk county, at 12 1/2 cents. Other buys, totaling several hundred bales, are reported to have been made by the same firm, who are not yet prepared to furnish details.

The Pratum lot of 1904s from oCrealis was bought today by Louis Lachmund & Co. at 10 cents. E. P. McCarthy this morning at Dallas bought 100 bales at 12 1/4 cents, the lowest quotation of the day.
