A Great Horse Man Broke.

The World: Michael F. Dwyer, a few years ago the foremost figure on the American turf, today is a broken-down man, helpless physically, riding about the scenes of his former triumphs behind a broken down horse that once made records on the track, driven by a broken down jockey who once wore the famous "all white" colors of the Dwyer stable and carried them to victory again and again.

"Mike Dwyer, shrewd, careful, the best judge of horses and the smartest better than ever laid odds," is "broke," dependent on the bounty of

others, beaten by the game of which he was the acknowledged master.

The whole story is a tragedy of the turf. "Mike" Dwyer, twenty years ago, was the best known name whispered in the paddock. It first attracted attention when he abandoned his trade of butcher and, backed by the services of a horse or two, appeared among the bookmakers laying bets on "sure things." The sure thing was always his favorite gamble. Many a time he bet thousands on 1 to 6 entries, one day putting up \$50,000 to win \$30,000 and losing because the horse, though he won the race, was disqualified. Again

he bet \$60,000 to win \$6,000, and won this time. In those days the crowds followed him about, trying to follow plays, for it seemed he could not lose. He had few friends, Richard Croker being one. Generally at the track "Mike" Dwyer, always thin and pale, with a frown on his forehead, sat huddled up in a buggy in the infield just beside the judge's stand, nervously watching every movement of the great gathering of men and horseflesh.

It was Dwyer who persuaded Richard Croker to enter on a career of racing in England. Dwyer's methods had called forth some adverse comment here, and he was not popular. He and Croker with \$250,000 and a string of horses that included the most famous racers of the period, went abroad, but success failed to follow them, and one by one, Dwyer lost his horses to men whom he had estranged in the past. Little by little his fortune faded, and he finally returned to America, broken in purse and spirit.

"Dwyer" was down and out," said the Turf, and it seemed so far a while, but in 1901 and 1902 there came flashes of his old life. At Aqueduct, in the latter year, he had some luck with his horse Discus, but the change in fortune was only temporary, and ill-luck again got its grip on him.

From now on it was the down track for Dwyer, and at length, absolutely shattered in spirit as well as in health, he appealed for to his brother and was given it. Now the man who was worth \$2,000,000 more than once, and could lose \$100,000 a week without a tremor, is poorer than the horse that draws him over the sands of Coney Island.

Not long ago he was asked for a word of advice to young men with ideas that they can "beat the racing game."

With tears in his eyes the old man said: "After more than twenty years of racing I say that it is beyond human power to beat the betting ring. You can't do it, no matter how you try, for it is your judgment against others, theirs being backed with inside knowledge that you can't get. There was a time when it looked as though I had accomplished what others had failed in doing—you see the answer, don't you?"

"But there's no good in giving advice. I'm not in the mood for dispensing it, and young men won't take it, anyway. Just let me say, however, that if there are any fools, young or old, who believe that they have a di-

vine mission to beat the ring, let them go ahead and take their chances as I've done."
