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BATTLE FOR AN OPEN PORT.

The Eugene Development Convention was the beginning of a battle for an open deep sea harbor on the west coast of Oregon.

Commerce having been restricted and throttled via the Corvallis & Eastern through Yaquina Bay, the people look elsewhere.

The declaration of Harriman that he will build from DRAIN TO COOS BAY HAS TURNED ATTENTION OF WESTERN OREGON TO THAT HARBOR.

An open deep sea harbor on the west coast, with 26 feet of water, and a great railroad system connected therewith means a great deal to all Oregon.

It should be followed up by the producers and commercial clubs of western Oregon presenting an united front for A REAL OREGON PORT OF ENTRY for population, trade and commerce.

beautiful valleys with golden light, we wonder why this whole region has not long since become the garden spot of the western world.

TRIUMPH OF CO-OPERATION.

Ten years ago the Oregon Fire Relief Association was started at McMinnville with \$6.85 in the treasury.

Today it is carrying over twenty-million dollars of risks, with 20,000 policy holders in Oregon.

It shows constant increase in the amount of insurance carried WITH CONSTANTLY DECREASED RATIO OF LOSSES AND GAIN IN RESOURCES.

The fire insurance risks carried in 1904 cost the policy holders \$3.51 per \$1000, as against \$5.10 per \$1000 in stock companies.

That the business is growing in all parts of the state is shown by a gain of 1286 POLICIES WRITTEN AUGUST, 1905, AGAINST 1209 FOR THE SAME MONTH IN 1904.

Charles Grissen, the secretary, has compiled statistics showing city losses to cost \$1.757 per \$1000 against \$3.384 per \$1000 for barn losses.

Eastern Oregon losses cost \$4.489 per \$1000 for Western Oregon losses.

The company by report for the quarter ending July 1, 1905, had about \$40,000 in cash funds, real estate and other resources \$13,000. Liabilities about \$15,000.

The right to be let alone in the pursuit of your legitimate business is well established.

If all Portland arose as one man to demand the removal of the state institutions from Salem to that city, it would fail.

It becomes a matter for ridicule then for one newspaper, EVEN THOUGH IT WERE ALL-POWERFUL, WHICH IT IS NOT, TO MAKE SUCH A PROPOSITION.

The people of Salem should hold no grudge against the people of Portland on account of the Oregonian's unwise talk. They should not boycott the retail, wholesale or manufacturing businesses of Portland.

A NEW HOP COMBINE

Growers Get Together for the Purpose of Mutual Aid and Protection

Some 35 hop growers from this part of the valley met in this city yesterday for the purpose of forming an organization to take the place of the defunct Hop Growers' Association.

J. K. Sears, of Polk county, was elected chairman, and a committee, consisting of Henry Fletcher, J. K. Sears, W. H. Woods, Oliver Beers and W. H. Egan, was appointed to draft a constitution and by-laws. This committee will meet in Salem next Saturday to perform its labors.

The object of the organization is to collect and disseminate among its members accurate information concerning the supply and demand, and the progress of the hop market, so far as to enable the individual members to sell or hold, to the best advantage. The organization will also have corporate power to buy and sell.

The principal object of the old organization was to form pools under the control of the association, which were to be sold by a sales committee.

The new organization will employ a competent man at a good salary to collect the information, which will be given to the members only, unless it is thought best to make it public.

SCAPEGOT DIES PAUPER.

Great Fortune Was His for the Asking.

Bellingham, Wash., Oct. 19.—Late yesterday afternoon examination of the effects of William Wilson, a stonecutter and marbleworker, who died in destitute circumstances this morning, discloses the fact that \$300,000 in cash on deposit in New York, left from the estate of a brother, J. R. Wilson, who recently died in Peru, was awaiting his claim. The brother's will further bequeathed a third interest in steamships and other property, making the total value of the inheritance nearly \$900,000. In addition \$60,000 cash from the estate of another brother, R. A. Wilson, late editor of the Bellingham Morning News, and a prominent writer of Ireland, was awaiting the appearance of William Wilson in New York.

Until he became ill, Wilson had been employed for some time in a marble works here. His employer sent him to the hospital and had him cared for during his sickness. Some time ago Wilson told Mr. Turer, his employer, that he had a millionaire sister in New York, and a son who is a prominent lawyer of that city. He steadfastly refused, however, to give their names, saying he had been the scapegoat of the family, and did not want them to know of his present condition.

Wilson was an expert workman at his trade. Evidence of his wealth was discovered in letters which he had kept in his trunk, and which urged him to go to New York, where he had a brother, in addition to the son and sister.

ACCOUNTS FINALLY SETTLED

The city council, at its meeting Tuesday night, finally disposed of the matter of ex-treasurer John Moir's final accounts, which have caused that body no end of trouble. Committees have been appointed to investigate, but agreement has ever been reached, until Tuesday night, when the ways and means committee brought in the following report, which unanimously adopted:

To the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon:

Your committee on ways and means beg leave to report that in the matter of the balances of city funds in the hands of John Moir, as city treasurer, at the close of his term in said office on the 6th day of January, 1905, that we have examined the several reports of the committees heretofore appointed by this council to investigate said matter, and that we are unable to harmonize these several reports, and after careful consideration we recommend that the following balances set opposite the several city funds hereinafter named be accepted as the amounts in the hands of said city treasurer at the close of his said term of office on said day, and said amounts having been turned over, that his bondsmen be released from further liability.
