TEDDY'S LITTLE JAUNT

Gets the Glad Hand and Lots of Music Through the Southern States

Roswell, Ga., Oct. 20.—Half the population of this town was assembled at the station at 7 o'clock this morning, when the special train with the President and his party on board, arrived. Senator Clay, who had met the President's train at Chamblee and had come back with the President, taking breakfast with him on the train, acted as master of ceremonies upon the arrival of the train.

When the train rolled into the station, which was decorated with American flags and bunting in the national colors, the crowd assembled in the station, began to cheer and hats and handkerchiefs were waved, when the President, accompanied by Senator Clay, appeared on the platform. A committee of reception, consisting of Mayor Sherman, S. Y. Stripling and S. Crowley was awaiting the President at the station and after President Roosevelt has shaken hands all around, he and the members of the reception committee took seats in a carriage and drove through the handsomely decorated streets of the town to Barrington Hall, the residence of Mrs. Baker, who was one of the bridesmaids at the wedding of President Roosevelt's mother. Mrs. Baker invited President Roosevelt to breakfast, but owing to the fact that his time was too limited, President Roosevelt was compelled to decline the hospitable invitation of his mother's friend. He remained at the house but a short time, and was delighted at meeting "Aunt Grace," an old colored woman, who had been his mother's maid. The old woman voluntarily expressed her joy over her "Miss Little's boy" and never tired of "courteasing" whenever "Mama Theodore" addressed her. The President also met and shook hands with "Un-

cle Billy Jackson," who also had been a slave of the Bulloch family.

From Barrington Hall the President drove to his mother's old home, Bulloch Hall, a charming old colonial mansion, now owned and occupied by Mr. J. B. Wing. After a short inspection of the house and grounds President Roosevelt returned to his carriage and drove to the City Park, where a stand had been erected for the President. He was received with an enthusiastic ovation and after he had been introduced by young Charles Reed, one of Roswell's promising young men, at present a student at Mercer University, delivered a short address. Then he returned to the station and at half past eight continued his journey to Atlanta.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 20.—This is a great day for Atlanta and the many thousands of visitors which the state fair and the visit of President Roosevelt had attracted. The special train bearing President Roosevelt and his party, arrived here promptly at 11 o'clock in the forenoon. Several thousand people were assembled at the station to welcome the President upon his arrival and they cheered and waved their hats and handkerchiefs in a manner which left no doubt as to the President's popularity. A committee consisting of the mayor and fifteen prominent citizens greeted President Roosevelt and escorted him to his carriage. The other members of the President's party, accompanied by members of the reception committee, also occupied carriages and then the whole party started on a drive through the city. The President's carriage was surrounded by a mounted escort, consisting of a detail from Georgia Military academy, at College Park. After an extended drive through the most beautiful parts of the city the President was taken to the club house of the Piedmont Driving club, where he was the guest of honor at a reception, followed by a luncheon. Only four hundred citizens had been invited to the reception and only a few of the most prominent men attended the luncheon.

In the afternoon President Roosevelt will review the Seventeenth Infantry, U. S. A., now stationed at Fort McPherson, the Fifth regiment Georgia state troops, and several companies from other parts of the state. Colonel Van Orsdale of the Seventeenth Infantry, commanded the regular and state troops at the review and Colonel Clifford L. Anderson, of the Fifth Georgia, acted as President Roosevelt's aide. After the review President Roosevelt was escorted to the speakers' stand which had been erected opposite the grand stand of the race course and delivered an address to the enormous crowd assembled on and in front of the grand stand.

At seven o'clock this evening the President will leave Atlanta in his special train, to continue his Southern trip. He will reach Macon at 10 o'clock tonight, but will only stop there five minutes, to address a few words to the crowd which will greet him upon the arrival of the train in the station. Then the train will continue its journey reach Jessup, Ga., at half past five tomorrow morning. The next long stop will be made at Jacksonville, Fla.

In Place of Explosives.

Consul General Hallway of Halifax reports that the Dominion Coal company (Glace Bay, Nova Scotia) is testing a machine intended to take the place of explosives. It is a hydraulic cartridge, said to be successful in Great Britain. At present coal is blown down with powder after the undercutting is completed. In the use of the cartridge, after the undercutting and shearing are finished, a hole three and one-half inches in diameter is bored in

the coal parallel with the roof, where in the cartridge is inserted. A piston operates at one end and a pump at the other. The pump forces the water along a tube, until it comes in contact with the first piston and pushes it out. The pressure becomes general on all pistons, which commence to penetrate the coal in a downward direction. The pistons are set very close, there being scarcely half an inch between them. As the pressure increases the coal gradually leaves the roof and falls to the floor in the best saleable condition. When powder is used in blowing down coal there is considerable waste through breakage into dust and slack. It is claimed that this element of waste is greatly eliminated by the use of the cartridge, and 40 per cent more saleable coal is produced than by the ordinary methods of mining. The weight of the entire apparatus is 44 pounds. One man can operate it. The amount of water required is from a pint to a quart, according to the pressure needed to bring down the coal. The water is stored in a little reservoir attached to a pipe, and runs to the bottom of the pump. The machine is supposed to be especially serviceable in long wall and pillar work.

SALEM VERSUS PORTLAND

Two High School Elevens Meet Saturday on Willamette Field

Saturday one of the best academic football games of the season will be pulled off in this city. The game will be between the teams of the Salem and Portland high schools. This is the home team's first encounter with any of the Portland teams, and is the first time the Portland high school has ever played in Salem.

Although Portland is not as strong as usual this year, the team is made up of a husky bunch of boys, who will be hard to stop. On the other hand the local school has the best team in its history, and, as the boys are all keen for the game, they will put up a stubborn fight. They have improved wonderfully in team work since their defeat by McMinnville, and the team, in practice, now runs like clock work.

The local boys engaged in a practice game with the second Willamette bunch last night, and showed up wonderfully well, having improved greatly since the last encounter. Though W. U. made yardage, it was by sheer weight, and the high school not only kept them from scoring, but time and again went through the cardinal and gold for substantial gains.

In weight the two teams which will meet tomorrow, are about equal, and, although the local boys are speedy, Portland will probably match them in this respect, as they have been coached by Henderson, an old Michigan player, who learned the game under the famous Yost.

The Salem boys will line up about like this: Cary, 165, center; Miller, 165, left guard; Slater, 155, right guard; Jones, 177, left tackle; Maurer, 165, right tackle; Reanes, 135, left end; Williams, 145, right end; Rhodes, 130, quarterback; Cross, 140, left half; Matthews, 160, fullback; Catlin, 160, right half. Subs, Holman, Hall, Niles, Farmer.

The figures given above are not the stripped weights. The men stripped would average less than 154 pounds.

The Portland boys will come up in a special car on the 11 o'clock train, and will be accompanied by nearly 100 of their fellow students, who will do their best to cheer the team on to victory.

Salem should, and no doubt will, turn out a crowd of loyal supporters of such size and enthusiasm as to encourage the boys to do their very best work.

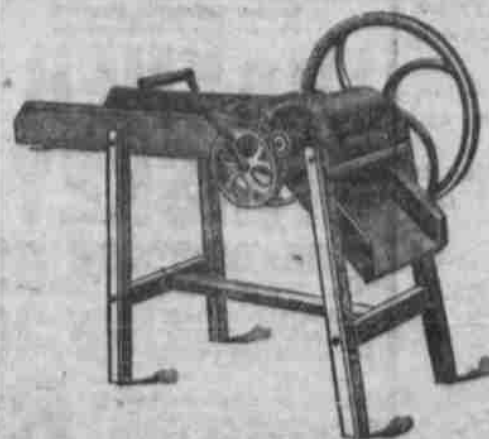
