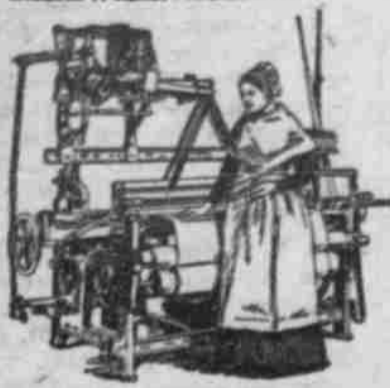

Frink, 98 bales, 12 cents; W. T. Foster, 24 bales, 12 cents; Peter Hansen, 210 bales, 12 cents; Jacob Smith, 80 bales, 12 1/4 cents.

W. B. Veits, who has charge of the Otto Hansen hop yard, near Oak Grove, was in the city today. He says the hop crop around there is much larger than expected, and also of better quality, in fact, all are considered very choice. He has his crop stored here.
