Alonso Gesser, third ward.  
J. Frank Hughes, fourth ward.  
George R. Jacobs, fifth ward.  
E. O. Churchill, sixth ward.  
John Heyne, seventh ward.

All of these gentlemen have given their time to the task of carrying on a creditable city government the past year, and deserve a great deal of credit, and the thanks of the community for giving their services without pay, and in such a public-spirited manner.

If any of these gentlemen would continue to serve the city they would certainly be entitled to the honor of having their names presented at the primary for nomination. They have performed the duties of the office with faithfulness and dignity, and have stood up for the progress of the city.
