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THE PRIMARY LAW.

One "Vote" is permitted in the Salem Statesman to misrepresent the Journal in connection with the U'Ren primary law.

As the City Council did not see fit to take the necessary steps to put that primary law in operation, all who did not get their candidates' petitions filed by last Friday evening are to be shut out from being party candidates.

Only four wards have any Republican candidates and only one Democrat is put up. What kind of a city election is that going to provide, anyhow?

The people are entitled to fair treatment under any law.

Why did the City Council fail to give the notice required by law?

Why does the Statesman insist so strongly that the time for making nominations shall not be extended?

What is the scheme, anyhow? And in whose interest is it being worked?

Is there any candidate so weak that he cannot be nominated if there is anyone allowed to run against him at the primaries?

THE STATESMAN MAKES IT LOOK THAT WAY.

Some good men have been named in the petitions. But no man is so good that the people can be forced to take him.

Six weeks is too long for a city campaign, but what is the use of a long campaign if no opposing candidates are going to be allowed?

The U'Ren primary law is impractical enough without being construed upon technicalities. The present scheme is as bad as when the boxes used to hold primaries Saturday, conventions Saturday night and elections Monday.

Some of the petitions are signed by Democrats, and few of the signers are registered as required by law.

But, strictly construed, the U'Ren primary law makes it almost impossible to nominate anyone.

The City Council can extend the time for filing nominations or the people will be forced to vote for other than party candidates.

Presbyterian Synod of Baltimore.

Wilmington, Del., Oct. 23.—The annual meeting of the Presbyterian synod of Baltimore opened here this morning at the West Presbyterian church. About 175 ministers, representing 200 churches and 20,000 communicants in Delaware, Maryland and the District of Columbia, and a large number of lay members are in attendance. The Rev. Dr. Robinson, of Baltimore, moderator of the synod, presided at the opening meeting. The convention is of considerable importance, as many important matters will come up for consideration, including the election of a new moderator. The synod has the supervision of the presbyterial records, and adjudicates any cause of complaint or appeal for or against or from the lower courts. Such cases are called judicial, and, by a law of the church, are adjudicated by commissions appointed for that purpose. Many prominent ministers of the church are in attendance, and will calve the proceedings by addresses.

TO IMPROVE WESTERN OREGON

Another Seaport Is the Aim of the Valley Development League

A meeting of the executive committee of the Willamette Valley Development League was held in McMinnville on Monday evening. It was decided to hold a number of meetings in various counties throughout Western Oregon, for the purpose of urging the construction of a railroad from Eugene via Drain to Coos Bay.

Coos Bay is the largest harbor between San Francisco and Puget Sound. It now has a depth of 26 feet on the bar, and this can easily be increased to 30 or even 40 feet. The bay itself forms an ideal harbor of great extent. It is destined to be the site of one of the largest cities on the coast, and will prove of immense advantage in developing the resources of Western Oregon.

The Willamette valley is at the mercy of Portland; Southern Oregon is in the hands of San Francisco. The coast counties have practically no outlet, except by small coasting steamers. The improvement of Coos Bay harbor would provide a competitor for both San Francisco and Portland. There is no desire on the part of those urging the improvement of Coos Bay harbor and the construction of a railroad thence, to "back" Portland. In fact, Portland is so well located as regards shipping advantages that she will continue to develop, and that far more rapidly than in the past. The building of a seaport town of importance at Coos Bay may take away some of Portland's export trade. On the other hand, it will do so much to develop the wealth of Western Oregon, that Portland will more than make up for sharing its business with another city.

The farmers of the Willamette valley are vitally interested in securing another outlet for their products. It is but natural for Portland to reach out for trade that may possibly go to other ports—for instance that of the Inland Empire. The trade of the Willamette valley, under present conditions, must go through that port, and for this reason the metropolis feels that it is not incumbent on her to make any special effort on behalf of the valley in the way of transportation facilities or rates—the traffic is hers without effort.

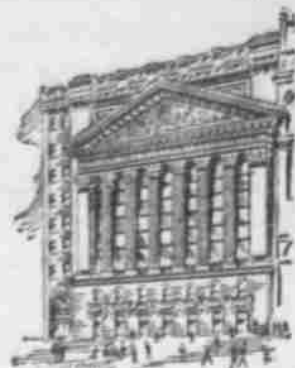
