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## OREGON FULL OF PRUNES

The Best in the World, and Salem is in the Center of the Industry

"You can say that, take it year in and year out, in Oregon, there is no branch of agriculture that pays so constant and liberal dividends as the prune industry." That was the startling statement made to a Journal reporter by W. C. Tillson of the Tillson company of this city.

"There is no danger that the present high prices for prunes will weaken," said H. S. Gile, president of the Willamette Valley Prune association. He bases this statement upon the ground that there are not 50 car loads of prunes in the whole state of Oregon, that are not sold.

According to the statements of both of these men, the Oregon prune which has always led the world, is this year superior to the prune of all former years. The season seemed to be just right for the proper development, and the result was that we have a larger prune and richer in sugar. The excellent quality combined with the fact that the demand for prunes now exceeds the supply, enabled the producers to sell their crop at good prices.

This year's prunes were nearly all 30-40's and brought from four and a half to five cents per pound. Many whole crops were sold for five cents without any grading. At this rate it will be seen, by any one who is at all familiar with the industry, that prunes will pay better than any kind of grain. One widow who has eight acres in prunes, sold her crop for \$1700, while a man with nearly 40 acres cleared up between \$4000 and \$5000.

"It is a good industry and well adapted to this state and this vicinity," says Mr. Tillson, and the facts seem to bear out his testimony. There were three million pounds raised in the state this year, though it is considered an off year, and they are all out of first hands.

The crop this year throughout the entire state, was about one-third of what it was two years ago. In the vicinity of Salem, however, it is generally considered to be more than a third because of the fact that many of the orchards are located on hill lands, and the hill lands yielded better than the bottom lands, this season.

## Salem the Prune Center.

That Salem is the prune center of Oregon there can be no doubt. More prunes are packed in this city than by all the other packers of the states. The business of these two firms is constantly growing, as is seen by the fact that both of these establishments have handled double the amount of prunes this year that they have handled any previous year, and this, in spite of the fact that the present crop is short.

The "postage stamp" freight rate on prunes has enabled the packers to ship in their prunes from every quarter of the state. According to this rate it costs 10 cents per 100 pounds to ship prunes from Turner to Salem, and just the same from Medford to Salem. As a result, the Salem packer can pay the southern Oregon grower just as much for his product as the man who lives within a few miles of the city. Prunes have, and are being shipped in this year by the carload from nearly every station in the state. Those points which have furnished the most are Woodburn, Medford, McMinnville, Grants Pass, Jefferson, Albany, Corvallis, Shaw, Oakland and Dallas. Gile & Co. employ from 60 to 70 people and have a weekly pay roll of

about \$450, while Tillson & Co. employ about 25 men and 50 girls and have a weekly pay roll of nearly \$500. Mr. Tillson estimates that he has paid out nearly \$150,000 for prunes this year, and as this all comes from the east it is just so much added to the capital of the country.
