RIDING A HOBBY.

To all persons who have been regular readers of Colliers' Weekly, and have for years appreciated its ability and fairness, it must be something of a disappointment to find that Journal in the ranks of the hobby riders. It has joined the crusade against patent medicines and its ardor seems to confine its dingle to a few remedies. Its last edition is particularly an attack on Peruna. Whatever Peruna may be, good or bad, does not enter into this matter, but the fact that so able a paper as Colliers entirely forgets itself to such an extent as to make silly and self-evident misstatements about it, is painful. Besides presenting illustrations of the large amount of alcohol in this and other remedies, it goes on to argue the case. It proves that Peruna is very largely made up of alcohol. It then commits a mental lapse that is inexcusable, when it says that this strong intoxicant containing such a large percentage of alcohol only costs 8 cents a quart to manufacture, including bottles, labels, etc. This paper does not advertise Peruna, and has no interest in defending that medicine, in fact it takes little stock in any medicine, but it cannot resist the temptation to point out this unfairness and folly of an otherwise great paper, that is riding a hobby. Colliers makes its great fight against patent medicines ostensibly as a temperance measure, but fails to point out that nearly all forms of medication, including doctor's prescriptions, contain a large percentage of liquor. This great paper also forgets that its columns contain glaring whisky advertisements. Verily, when an individual or a newspaper gets to riding it forgets to remember some things of importance.

Typewriter Smiles.

The Roseburg Plaindealer comes out enlarged for the twice-a-week edition, and is a very strong local paper. The new editor is so modest he does not print his name on the first section. But modesty was ever a part of the equipment of successful journalism.

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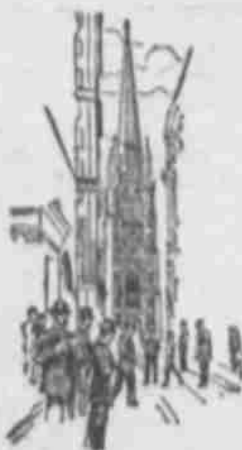
