Harold Bauer.

This German pianist is making another tour of our country. The more one hears of this accomplished artist the clearer it becomes that he is the great all around pianist of the present time. The U'Ren Primary Law.

This city has had the first trial of the new direct primary law drawn up by Mr. U'Ren, of Oregon City, and his committee of law makers.

That it is a rank failure is the general opinion of those who watch its workings. In theory it seems all right but in practice all wrong.

In each of the seven wards five officials were employed at public expense, and tickets printed at public expense, costing about \$100.

Figuring the cost of poll books and advertising and posting notices the primary will cost about \$200, enough to build a good bridge.

For two years the city political committees held the right kind of a direct primary at no expense whatever to the public.

At the U'Ren primary Democrats, Socialists, Prohibitionists and Independents all voted to nominate Republican candidates.

Under the former direct primary, only Republicans voted in naming Republican candidates. The U'Ren primary makes nominations by the mob possible.

Party nominations are not accomplished after the manner in which the primaries were conducted at Salem Saturday. The system must be improved or abolished.

The \$200 the city will pay would have built a good bridge or a block of good streets. If the voters had been registered it would have cost a great deal more.

This is not said to discredit the nominees under the direct primary made Saturday, who are all good men and will stand on their merits, but to show the uselessness and expense of a primary that does not accomplish what it pretends—the making of party nominations.

The McMinnville Convention.

This week will end with a big development convention at the county seat of Yamhill county to promote the opening of another deep sea harbor on the west coast of Oregon.

The announced determination of the Harriman system to construct a branch from its main line to Marshfield, on Coos Bay, has stirred up great interest in the improvement of that harbor.

All Western Oregon is deeply interested in another outlet to deep sea commerce. There is an excellent harbor at Yaquina Bay and when the Corvallis & Eastern road is extended it will have commerce.

The present movement is not to lessen the interest in other harbors, nor in the improvement of the Columbia, but to emphasize the importance of having another open harbor with a railroad into it.

The commerce of Coos Bay is already considerable. The lumbering interests, the coal mines, the other commerce already there make it very important the railroad should be built.

A back door, an open door, for the shipment of Willamette Valley products out to the sea, and north and south on the coast, and to foreign ports is of the greatest importance.

The McMinnville convention proposes to bring out fully the value of another competitive market for West-

ern Oregon. All this will be done with due regard to the rights and interests of all parts of the state.

"A Square Deal for Oregon" is the motto of the Willamette Valley Development League, and that means the whole state and all of the state.

MAY SHIP ORE TO ALASKA

A special to the Sacramento Bee from Tonopah, Nevada, Oct. 30, says: With thousands of tons of high-grade ores piled on their dumps and with no immediate market for their product because the smelters of the country are swamped with silicious ores for the reduction of which they cannot obtain sufficient fluxing ores, the shippers of Tonopah and Goldfield are negotiating with the transportation companies with a view of shipping their product to Alaska where fluxing ores are abundant. Following the order of the American Smelting and Refining company, mention of which was made in the Bee nearly two weeks ago, came embargo orders from the various independent smelters, all of which have thousands of tons of Nevada ore piled in their bins, which they cannot reduce because they have exhausted their surplus of flux. At Salt Lake alone one smelter has over \$2,000,000 worth of Nevada ore on hand, and the smelter at Everett, Washington, has a supply that will last it for a year. The Selby smelter, near Denali, the smelters of Kenwick, Pueblo, Denver and at Park City, are overstocked, and the only solution is the discovery of new lead deposits or exportation of the ores to the Alaskan districts. Recently the Selby company considered the importation of flux from Treadwell, Alaska, but as several tons of this is necessary to the reduction of a ton of the rich Nevada ore, it will be cheaper to send the Nevada ore there.

Not only are the smelters short on fluxing ores, but they are being overtaxed by the shipments from Nevada," said one of their shipping agents yesterday. "At Garfield, Utah, an immense smelter is being built to accommodate the new business and nearly all of the old plants are being enlarged, but this is slow work for machinery has to be made to order and it takes many months to equip and open such a plant after building commences. The congestion would be less serious if there was an abundance of lead, iron and copper ore to use as flux, but this is not the only difficulty."
