LAX IN AMERICA

In European countries flax which is pulled up by hand and laid in bunches to be retted and further treated by breaking, hatching, etc. It can also be cut with a scythe or reaping machine, but this sacrifices the valuable part of the root and lower portion of the stalk, so that in the best and most economical practice the crop must still be pulled. It is said that in the United States machines for pulling, breaking and hatching flax have been invented and are now used with extra success for accomplishing the processes which in Europe, notably in Russia, are generally performed by hand. The proposition submitted is, therefore, whether the time has not come for the farmer

of the United States to seriously consider this new product, which they may obtain from their lands simply by the adoption and practice of methods which are standard, perfectly understood and no longer experimental.

It has been demonstrated that several states of the Union will grow flax fibre of the long, fine, silky quality, which commands the highest prices in the European markets. Quantities of it have been brought to Ireland and spun into threads up to Nos 60 and 70 with entire success. The time will come, doubtless, when the most, if not all, of the linen supply, which now forms such a heavy and costly article of import will be grown, spun and woven in the United States. But even then the mills and factories of Ireland, England, France and Germany will still always be in the market, as now, for fibre from which to produce the linen fabrics that are used in their own countries and exported to other European nations, the southern hemisphere and the East. In the opinion of experts the demand for American flax fibre, if once met and supplied, will be large, growing and constant. Linnen of all but the most ordinary qualities is now a luxury beyond the reach of the multitude of working people, whose cheap cotton fabrics in its stead. The cheapening of the raw fibre by an extraordinary increase in the supply would unquestionably develop and extend its use to an important degree.—Consul-General Mason, at Berlin.

Mrs. Roger's Last Hope.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 6.—The appeal in the case of Mrs. Mary M. Rogers, convicted of the murder of her husband, Marcus Rogers, and sentenced to death by the Vermont court, was taken up by the United States supreme court today, to decide the question whether the constitutional rights of Mrs. Rogers were violated during her trial in Vermont, as is contended by her counsel. Upon her appeal to the United States supreme court Mrs. Rogers was relieved until December 8, and the case was set for today upon the request of the Vermont state government, so as to give ample time to pass upon the questions involved in the habeas corpus before the expiration of the reprieve.

BOOSTING FOR THE COAST

Western Oregon Newspapers United for a Deep Sea Harbor

Coo Bay people should feel a lively interest in the work of the Willamette Valley Development League. This organization seems to be quite independent of Portland influences, and in fact, in the hands of men who are alive to the fact that the hope of getting the state out from under the baleful influence of the pawnshop on the lower Willamette lies in concerted action in the rest of the state, looking to the upbuilding of a rival metropolis and seaport. Coo Bay is being talked by the Willamette Valley Development League as the solution of the problem, and Coo Bay people should see to it that this sentiment in the interior of the state is fanned to the point of action.

The Capital Journal, edited by E. Hofer, president of the League, has been putting in many good words for Coo Bay, and Walter Touse, of Woodburn, another prominent member of the League, is boosting for us. A meeting of the League has been called at McMinnville on the 11th of this month, to be devoted to the consideration of Oregon harbors. It is especially desired by the members of the League that Coo Bay be represented at this meeting, and we should certainly see that the opportunity is not neglected.

Probably no one thing has so stirred Portland to seek the support of the state and cry out that she is a special friend of the harbors south of the Columbia as the dispatch from Washington stating that the annual estimates of the war department will contain no recommendation for an appropriation for work on the Columbia river, notwithstanding the fact that many engi-

neers assert that work on the bar must be suspended unless more money is appropriated at the next session of Congress. So long as there is plenty of money in sight to keep the Columbia open Portland gets along swimmingly, but when it begins to look as indicated in the dispatch alluded to she first tries to drive the rest of the state to her support and, failing in that, falls over herself in an attempt to gain our good graces by putting us on the back and saying, "Go in, old man, and let us develop the whole state." There was a time when the Oregonian and Portland pretty nearly dominated the state, but that time is rapidly passing away. The people have awakened to the fact that they have been led around by the nose long enough and are asserting themselves. They are proud of the big city near the Willamette, but they are not ready that she shall develop and other portions of the state stay in the background. There are other harbors along the coast of Oregon, and other public interests that all are, or should be, interested in besides the Columbia. Let Portland work together with the balance of the state in developing every part and parcel and the result will be most gratifying. No one part of the state should try to "hog" everything.

Now comes Portland close on the heels of the wind-up of the Fair and persistently suggests the removal of the capital to that city. The state schools, which are now getting along fairly well, it is suggested be removed to Portland. Mr. Harriman is told to build more roads and to aim every mile toward Portland. The railroad magnate's task is not done with building roads to Portland. He is told he must get into the Columbia river and dig. He must help make a channel for the big ships that are to be commanded to come to Portland. Next in order would be a demand for the removal of the Columbia bar above Portland, leaving Astoria high and dry. Portland is asking three-fourths of the delegation in congress to resign. Perhaps they should, but the mandate should come from the people generally, rather than Portland only. Next she will be dictating who shall and who shall not be sent to congress.

Portland is growing ungraciously impatient, audaciously greedy.
