HEAD CONSUL BOAK

Makes Eloquent Address, Chamberlain, Tooze and Others Make Addresses

The large auditorium of the First Methodist church of this city was last night crowded to its capacity to listen to the address given by Head Consul Boak, of the Woodmen of the World.

At 7:30 a procession was formed at the Willamette Hotel, and led by the Reform School band, the degree team and members of the order escorted their honored guest and neighbor to the church. Mr. Boak holds the highest office in the gift of the order, and the local lodge, assisted by the residents of the Capital City, vied with each other in doing him honor.

Consul Commander Hanson, of the local camp, called the assemblage to order, and in few well-chosen words introduced Hon. Walter L. Tooze, of Woodburn, as the chairman of the evening. Tooze, in his usual pleasing, witty manner, completely captivated the audience, and proceeded to take charge of the evening's program, as if he was accustomed to such things.

Wallace Trill, of this city, gave as a reading "The Arena Scene," from Quo Vadis, which was greatly appreciated by the audience. The Stewart quartet, which had opened the program, gave another number, and then Governor Chamberlain was introduced. His appearance was greeted with a storm of applause, and his few words aroused a great deal of enthusiasm in regard to fraternalism in general, and the Woodmen of the World in particular.

The head consul was then introduced. Mr. Boak is a very eloquent speaker, and he had no trouble whatever in keeping the attention of the audience.

He has a faculty of mingling good and appropriate stories with the solid parts of his addresses, which makes him everywhere very popular as a speaker. His address was, of course, along the lines of fraternalism, and he took occasion to call attention to the progress which the Woodmen of the World had made, and the large sums of money which they are annually paying to widows and orphans, instead of making contributions of \$100,000 to campaign funds. Incidentally he gave the McCalls and the McCurdys and their ilk several digs, and called them post-graduates of the highest school of modern graft. He stated that the people were getting tired of this sort of thing, and that what this country was now crying for was honest men, men who have the courage of their convictions, and who cannot be bought for a price. "This country needs more Roosevelts, more Lafollets, more Jeromes, more Chamberlains, if you please," declared Mr. Boak, and the applause which followed showed that the audience agreed with him.

Mr. Tooze then brought the meeting to a close with a rousing speech, in which he praised the work of the order, and of its head consul and other efficient officers; after which the members of the order and the entire audience were invited to adjourn to the Woodman hall, where the ladies of Woodcraft had prepared a bounteous repast, which was greatly enjoyed by all. The idea of having the Sunday school pupils take a part in the upbuilding of the University was originated by Mrs. Lee Paget, of Portland, who is an alumna of Willamette, and this is the first time that it has ever been tried. The Sunday schools of Portland have made preparations to give monster entertainments, and the one which will be given in this city promises to be of a high order.

The school will be assisted by the orchestra from the blind school, and Miss Chapler, who, always a favorite with Salem audiences as a reader, has, since her return from Chicago, become still more of an attraction.
