RAILWAY RATE REFORM

Ashland Tidings Takes the Salem Statesman to Task

(Ashland Tidings, Rep.)

The Salem Statesman will have to find a better case against the Roosevelt administration than that which it essays to make out of the incidents of the rump inter-state commerce law convention at Chicago, to convince anybody that its opposition is well founded, either in reason or in fact. The paper is widely astray as to the origin and the proceedings of the inter-state commerce law convention and its disturbed state of mind, that the right of free speech and open discussion, so dear to Americans, as it says, may be passed as more affected than real for the purposes of its hostility to the policy of railroad rate regulation. It does not care who called the convention, since it was for the purpose of discussion of railway rate legislation, but most people will agree that an assembly of a party committed to some particular policy or doctrine and who call a public meeting for the purpose of organization to promote such policy or doctrine, have a right to protect themselves against hostile intrusion designed to divert their proceedings to an opposite course and to defeat their purposes. That is practically what was attempted by the delegates who went to thwart any endorsement of President Roosevelt's rate regulation policy, although the convention was called for that purpose. Failing in this they set up a convention of their own, made the specious plea that

they had been unfairly dealt with by the regular convention, which refused them admission, just as a Republican convention or a Catholic assembly would not permit Democrats or Protestants to enter and manage their meetings, and assumed the audacity to proclaim themselves the only legitimate inter-state commerce law convention. The call for this convention stated that the object of the convention is to impress upon congress the extent and persistence of the demand of the people of all parts of the country for legislation outlined in the president's last annual message to congress in the following language: "The inter-state commerce commission should be vested with the power, where a given rate has been challenged and after full hearing found to be unreasonable, to decide, subject to review, what shall be a reasonable rate to take its place; the ruling of the commission to take effect immediately and to obtain unless and until it is reversed by the court of reviews." In his address at Chautauque, N. Y., on the 11th of August last, the President declared his belief in the immediate necessity for legislation "confering upon some branch of the executive government the power of effective action to remedy the abuse in connection with railway transportation." The result of the effort to secure legislation of this character, continued during the past five years, seems likely to reach a determination at the coming session of congress. The importance of such a demonstration of the public interest in the legislation at this time will be effective in its influence upon congress cannot be overestimated, and it is hoped that the opportunity presented by the convention for this purpose will be utilized by the sending of delegates for the enactment of such legislation." This seems to make it clear enough that men who seek to defeat the President's policy had a business in the convention and they were very properly excluded. They had all the free speech they wanted in their own rump convention. The fact is that they went there, in a large part, as guests of the railroads and with the avowed purpose, not only to defeat the objects of the convention, but to turn it into one which would further the purposes of the railway companies whose representatives they were. The Statesman's solicitude for the rights of these men is misplaced. They were amply able

to take care of themselves. The movement behind the proposed railroad rate regulation is intended to restrain the transportation companies from directing all the business of the country. They are not concerned about free discussion. There will be plenty of that. What the people want is some machinery that will effectively secure just and equitable freight rates throughout the states. The Statesman is very much alone in Oregon in its unfriendly attitude towards the administration, but where it attempts to criticize its opinions will be received with greater respect if there is less disregard for the facts on which they are based than is illustrated in its editorial treatment of the railroad rate question where it concerns President Roosevelt.

A new senior has been enrolled in the high school this week.

A student body meeting was called Tuesday to discuss the matter of the student tax. As is usually the case, the tax is no small amount of contention between the pupils. Although the custom of taxing students is a universal one, it remains to be seen whether it will work in the Salem high school.

Lord Rothchild's Birthday.

London, Nov. 8.—Lord Rothchild, the head of the London branch of the Rothchild banking establishment, celebrated his sixty-fifth birthday today. He received many letters and telegrams from all parts of the world congratulating him. Lord Rothchild was born in Piccadilly, London, on November 8, 1840. He is a son of Baron Lionel Nathan de Rothchild, and a grandson of Nathan Meyer de Rothchild, the Frankfurt banker. He was educated at Trinity college, Cambridge, and was a member of parliament for Aylesbury from 1865 to 1885.

REBUILD SALEM CANNERY

Fine Modern Plant in Place of One Burned

Hon. Geo. W. Holcomb, of Portland, was in Salem Monday, and decided to rebuild his cannery plant that burned last week. He will not rebuild the evaporator on the present site. The new cannery will have a capacity of 1000 cans per day.

Mr. Holcomb acquired an interest in the Allen Packing Co., at Salem, in 1900. In 1902 he succeeded that concern with the Salem Canning Co., and says they have made money at Salem each year that they have operated here. Mr. Holcomb says his company considers this a good location for a cannery.

The new cannery will have the most modern machinery, and will put up a better pack at less expense. His company has 65 acres of Cuthbert raspberries, and about as many acres of blackberries and other varieties under contract from one to three years. Asked
