Finds Things Doing at Klamath Falls and Coos Bay

Daniel Webster Holmes returned last night from a trip to Klamath Falls and Coos Bay, where he has been attending courts and incidentally bagging ducks and other wild game in a record-breaking manner. He went in the Klamath country via Thral, Pokagon, and the stage line and found Klamath Falls enjoying a well-developed real estate boom. Lots have advanced from \$100 to \$600, and the hot springs that were sold one year ago for \$2000 have recently changed hands for \$25,000. They are boring for hot water to supply the city and heat buildings. The falls is a hot place, not a house or room for rent, and boring into the earth is almost impossible, as the heat melts the rabbit metal used for bushings on the drills. Two California roads are pushing for the falls. The business nearly all goes to California. Work on the \$4,000,000 irrigation plant will begin in the spring and will employ hundreds of men. Bids on the construction will open December 20. Mr. Holmes had some fine duck hunting on the lakes, and then pulled out for Coos Bay, via Drain and Gardiner. He saw large forces of surveyors at work and no one doubts that the line will be built into Marshfield at fast as men and money will put it through.

The people in that whole section talk nothing but real estate and railroads. Money is going into both very rapidly. Mr. Holmes thinks there is plenty of money to be made in Coos Bay really, and a great many are already getting next. All the space between the two towns of North Bend and Marshfield is building up, and the two towns will soon be one. He came out on the steamer Rosanoke, drawing 21 feet. She went in on half tide, and came out on the same tide, without pilot or schooner. There is, in his opinion, a good 24 feet of water on the bar at half tide. Senator Fulton captured the hearts of the people over there by talking up their harbor, saying that 30 feet of water could be had with very little work by the government. There were thousands of acres of coal lands. The coal yields 16,000 tons to the acre, or 800 carloads. Most of it is shipped to 'Frisco now by the Speckles steamers and other vessels. Compared to wheat crop, it would take 35,000 years to turn off as much freight from an acre of land at the rate of 20 bushels to the acre, as coal will. He met James Watt, Del Pettyjohn and Dr. Toye, formerly of Salem, and Mr. Craven and Ira Smith, formerly of Polk county, who are in business there.

DEBATE WATER MATTERS

City Council Wrestles With Hydrants and Water Main--New Gambling Ordinance

The city council last night, at its regular meeting devoted a considerable part of its time to a discussion of water mains leading to fire hydrants. The question was brought up by an ordinance authorizing the street department to build a hydrant on the four-inch water main that runs out to the North school.

This commenced a discussion that lasted for half an hour, and was participated in by nearly every councilman present. All expressed themselves heartily in favor of placing street hydrants wherever required, but there was considerable opposition to putting any more hydrants on four-inch mains. It was claimed that the stream of water passing through a four-inch main would reach only 20 feet from the outlet, whereas a stream of over 85 feet came from a six-inch main.

In consequence, argued some of the councilmen, it would be useless to put hydrants on four-inch mains, and rely on them for protection. The matter was finally referred to the fire and water committee, who will undertake to negotiate with the new water company, and see if it is not possible to substitute six-inch for four-inch water mains wherever needed.

A petition signed by a large number of property owners near the Gidson Stolz factory, asking for the construction of hydrants to furnish adequate fire protection for the manufacturing enterprise and nearby buildings, for the same reason that no six-inch mains led to the factory, was referred to the fire and water committee.

William Kaiser, attorney for E. Eckerlen, who has pending against him informations for violation of the Sunday liquor law, and for selling liquor without a license, made a plea to the council in behalf of his client. He asked the city fathers to look kindly upon Mr. Eckerlen's derelictions, and assist him in getting out of his difficulties. He asked that the council instruct the city attorney to dismiss one of the indictments, in the case of Eckerlen pleading guilty to the other. A number of the councilmen expressed sympathy with Mr. Eckerlen in his trouble, but thought that their authority did not extend to the compromise of court cases. The matter was consequently laid on the table.

The report of Street Commissioner Kurtz for the first ten months of the year was submitted to the council. It was substantially as outlined in The Journal last week, and was placed on file.

A vacancy on the park board was filled by the election to the place of J. M. Lawrence.

An ordinance, introduced by Alderman Crozman, if successful in passing the council, will limit telephone tolls in this city. The measure provides that all residence phones on independent lines shall pay not more than \$1.25 monthly; on club lines, not more than \$1.00. All business phones shall be charged not more than \$2.50 monthly on independent lines; not more than \$2.50 on club lines. The penalty for violation of the ordinance is a fine of from \$25 to \$1000 or imprisonment from five to twenty-five days.

A new gambling ordinance was introduced and referred to the committee which has in hand the former ordinance. Both will be reported upon at a subsequent session of the council.

The street signs, which many business men advocate having placed at street intersections in the city, will not be erected at the present time. The report of the committee in whose hands the matter had been placed was favorable, and a resolution was moved before the council for the purchase and installation of the signs, 1204, the required number, at a cost of not over ten cents each. Councilman Frazer objected to the expenditure, and said he would not favor it until the council first made provision for the repair of a number of streets leading into the city, which, he considered, a much more important matter. The resolution ordering the purchase of street signs was laid on the table.

Street Cars to Liberty.

The committee soliciting subscriptions of cash and labor for the extension of the Salem street car system to Liberty is hard at work. They have called a meeting at the Liberty school house for this, Wednesday, evening, to report progress.

WANTS RIGHT OF WAY

Willamette Valley Railway Asks Council for Use of Cottage and Mill S's.

Actual demonstration to the people of this city that the Willamette Valley Railway Company is not a myth was made last night at the meeting of the city council, when an application was made for a right of way for the road through the city of Salem. The tracks are to be constructed on Cottage street, from the road passing the Polytechnic school, to Mill street, thence east on Mill, to the city limits, whence the road will strike off up the valley in a southerly direction.

The franchise is asked for nominally in the name of A. Welch. It is, of course, to be a link in the great chain of electric roads that, within two years, is expected to stretch from Portland to Roseburg. The franchise provides for the construction of a standard gauge road, steel rails, separate and apart from any existing line now within the city limit.

Similar franchises will be requested from the councils of Gervais and Woodburn, through both of which towns the new interurban will pass. When these have been secured, and pending options on part of the right of way taken up, actual construction will commence. It is the plan of the projectors of the line to hurry construction, and they will work simultaneously on the road at many points.

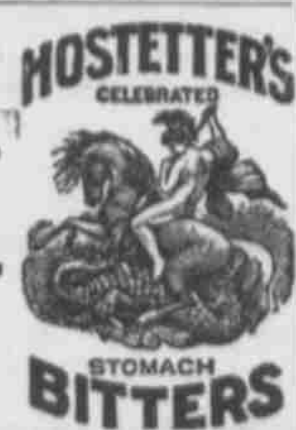
The franchise application introduced last night was referred to committee, and will be reported on as soon as possible.

To Improve Prison Library.

If the plans of Governor Chamberlain and Superintendent James, of the penitentiary and Miss Marvin, secretary to the state library commission, are carried out, the library at the state prison will be completely rehabilitated. New books on practical subjects will be purchased with money taken from a special fund, and volumes that offer neither instruction nor benefit to the convict will be retired from the shelves.

The prison library was thoroughly inspected yesterday afternoon by Miss Marvin and Superintendent James, and a decision arrived at to immediately take measures to improve it. Just what amount of money will be available for this purpose the governor has not yet determined. It will be taken

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from a fund at the disposition of the prison officials called the "betterment fund."
