**TOOK
LAUDANUM
ROUTE**

**Fred Parson of Ashland Takes
Deadly Drug in Pres-
ence of His Friends**

The little town of Ashland was
shocked Saturday when the news
spread that Fred Parson, the only
son of Dr. and Mrs. J. S. Parson, had
passed away from the effect of a dose
of laudanum, which he had taken with
suicidal intent. The act was committed
in the presence of half a dozen
friends in Rose Bros.' oyster parlors
Friday evening. Walking into the cafe
he told the boys he wanted to take
some medicine and to write a letter,
and immediately sat down and wrote
and sealed a note. He then produced
a bottle and took the medicine, which
it was afterwards learned was an ounce
of laudanum, after which he shook hands
with the boys and told them he was
going away. When asked where he
was going, he replied, "you'll hear
pretty soon." The boys thought it
was only a joke, and paid no attention,
until his condition became alarming,
and two of the boys put him in a buggy
and took him home. It was then too
late to save him, although three doctors
worked over him until 4 o'clock Satur-
day morning.

The act was premeditated, as the
note was a farewell letter containing
requests and the disposition of some
personal effects.

Mr. Parson had just returned from
Portland, and had been in the Tribune
office the day before, talking over a
proposition to do some reportorial
work, and at that time showed no signs
of despondency.

George Fred Parson was born Feb-
ruary 3, 1885, in Ashland. He was a
graduate of the local high school, and
at the time of his death was thinking
of taking up the study of medicine
with his father. He was well-known in
this city, where he has many friends.
He has been employed as a clerk at the
last two sessions of the Oregon legisla-
ture, and has often visited here. His
many friends here will be grieved to
learn of his untimely demise.

The funeral was held at Ashland yester-
day.
