HOP MEN DID NOT MEET

The mass meeting of the hop growers which was to have been held in this city Saturday for the purpose of effecting a permanent organization of the Oregon Hop Growers' Association, failed to materialize owing to the fact that sufficient notice had not been given and so only but the members of the executive committee was present. The matter of advertising the meeting had been left to the temporary chairman, J. K. Snow, and his sudden and serious illness made it impossible for him to attend to it.

The committee, however, called meetings to be held in every vicinity next Saturday, at which time delegates will be chosen to represent the vicinity at the state meeting, which is to be held in this city December 2, and at which time the constitution and bylaws will be adopted and the permanent organization effected.

The principal purpose of the organization will be the establishment of an information bureau, to secure reliable hop news from all parts of the world and to disseminate the same among the members of the association and the members only. It is figured that the cost of this bureau will be about \$2,000 per year and that if half the growers join the association the expense per member will be about 4 cents on each bale of hops raised. Of this sum \$1,200 will be the salary of the secretary, who must be a competent and reliable man, and the remaining \$800 will be for general expenses.

The organization will also endeavor to persuade congress to pass laws prohibiting the use of Quassa and Chittin bark in hop beer.

The Eugene Register Saturday prints a communication from one of its readers taking it to task for speaking well of the Southern Pacific railroad. The irate reader says:

"Editor Register: In this morning's paper in your call for more factories, you refer to the splendid 'railroad facilities.' Indeed! Since when? Why did the Heineke' tannery leave Eugene? The Southern Pacific furnish splendid railroad facilities? Splendid Hell!! Whomver heard of the Southern Pacific anywhere here or in California furnishing 'splendid railroad facilities?' Why is the Excelsior company going elsewhere? No doubt on account of the railroad facilities!! Why were all the sawmills closed a year or so ago? Also on account of the 'splendid railroad facilities.' It makes me sick to think of it. Six hours to go to Portland, 124 miles, and then talk about 'splendid railroad facilities!' RATS!!! The only hope for Eugene ever becoming a large city is to have the Siuslaw harbor improved, and if the people of Eugene now use up all their energy in helping Portland to get a deep harbor, we can whittle for a deepening for many years before a cent will be spent on the Siuslaw. The Southern Pacific will only assist us when they are forced to, and the way to force them and make them civil is to have a competing line and an outlet by way of the Siuslaw. Now don't throw this in the waste basket, but be manly enough to print the protest of TAXPAYER."
