Independent Action.

The interior of the state has numerous primary interests to promote and protect.

The interior has no legitimate cause to fight Portland or to oppose improvement of the Columbia.

We have and should have only GOOD WILL TOWARD PORTLAND AND THE COLUMBIA RIVER INTERESTS.

But we have tremendous interests that need fostering and promotion INDEPENDENT OF PORTLAND AND THE COLUMBIA.

We must fight for the development of the interior, for the opening of west coast harbors, and for the building of a large city on the coast, and another in the interior.

That is the meaning of sending a delegation of thirty representative men to Washington in January to work for our rivers and harbors, INDEPENDENT OF PORTLAND.

We must develop the resources of Western and Eastern Oregon, WITH THE HELP OF PORTLAND IF POSSIBLE, WITHOUT IT IF NECESSARY.

This state is big enough to have three or four large cities. There will be one in the Willamette valley wherever the great transportation lines to the inland empire east and west cross the main line of transportation north and south.

IT MAY BE SALEM. IT MAY BE ALBANY. IT MAY BE EUGENE. IT MAY BE ROSEBURG.

But development will come through independent lines of action—INDEPENDENT OF PORTLAND.
