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DEFINITION SAVED HIM.

Editor Did Not Mean Embellishment  
When He Wrote Graft.

Mayor Charles D. Mason of Gladstone, Wis., cannot collect damages from I. G. Champion, formerly editor and publisher of the Delta County Reporter, because of the alleged libelous articles that appeared in that paper last spring, according to the verdict rendered by the jury in the case. The formal verdict of "No cause for action" was returned after the jury was out an hour.

The bringing of the suit for libel against the former publisher of the Delta County Reporter was a result of a warm municipal campaign that was waged at Gladstone last spring, when the Reporter opposed the re-election of Mayor Mason.

In a series of articles which appeared in that paper during the campaign some of which were written by I. E. Shelly, opposition candidate for mayor against Mayor Mason, allegations of graft in the administration of the city's affairs were made. In the articles it was alleged that the funds of the city had been wasted by the administration then in power, and different allegations were made against Mayor Mason, which were taken by him, after being re-elected by a large majority, as a basis for a suit to recover damages to the amount of \$5000.

On the definition of the word graft hinged the defense, it being held by the former editor the Reporter that he understood the word to mean an unwise use of public funds and a use that would result in a personal gain for friends of the official having the direction of funds in charge.

Mr. Champion maintained that he had not intended that the word graft should be used as a slur against the personal character of the mayor and that other insinuating terms that were used were not intended to discredit the honesty of Mr. Mason. In his testimony Mr. Champion insisted that he believed Mayor Mason to be an honest man and would not and had not used his position for pecuniary gain.
