## ATTEMPTS LIFE OF THE CZAR

### A Grand Duke Tries to Kill Nicholas to Prevent Constitutional Reforms

(Four O'Clock Edition.)  
 Berlin, Dec. 1.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of a paper in this city wires that a grand duke today attempted to assassinate the Czar, to prevent the introduction of a constitutional government. He says the Czar was wounded in the hand. It is believed that Vladimir was the grand duke making the attempt.

Chicago, Dec. 1.—The Daily News correspondent of St. Petersburg says the Russian admiralty has evacuated Sevastopol. The government losses were six vessels, 23 officers and more than 1000 men. A conspiracy among the troops of the palace guard at Tsarko-Selo has been discovered. It was planned to capture the whole imperial family. The garrison has been replaced by the Semeev Life Guards. The financial panic is growing, and the banks have decided to stop outside operations.

Lodz, Russia, Dec. 1.—Most of the foreign manufacturers have closed their establishments, and every British resident has left for the frontier.

St. Petersburg Troubled.  
 St. Petersburg, Dec. 1.—The government is unable to learn of developments in the interior, and fear that the situation is worse. Witte says the government is hoping that he will turn the tide of affairs, but he is unable to begin reforms in an orderly manner. People fear tomorrow that troops from Kronstadt will bombard the capital. The telegraphers refuse to transmit messages to the Czar at Peterhof. A large leather factory was destroyed by fire today, presumably by persons hoping to start a reign of terror.

Manchester, England, Dec. 1.—A Guardian correspondent of St. Petersburg wires that the Manchurian army is entirely beyond the control of its officers, and that a fierce mutiny is in progress.

Will Mobilize the Assassins.  
 St. Petersburg, Dec. 1.—It is understood that the government intends to mobilize all the Cossacks, numbering 450,000.

No Mails Delivered.  
 St. Petersburg, Dec. 1.—Delivery of all mail was stopped this morning. The Czar has abolished martial law in Poland.

New York, Dec. 1.—The cable company announces that the delivery of messages at St. Petersburg is stopped. Communication with Finland is also interrupted.

Will Ask for Modifications of the Law  
 Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 1.—With the Pacific steamship Dakota, which ar-

rived here today a delegation of 32 Chinese statesmen and importers came to the United States to urge concessions to Chinese merchants and students in the new treaty to be negotiated between the United States and China. The delegates include a number of highly prominent merchants and representatives of the guilds and it is expected that they will be able to bring considerable pressure to bear upon congress.

Northwestern Rhodesia Joins Union.  
 Capetown, Dec. 1.—Beginning with today Northwestern Rhodesia forms a part of the South African customs union, with the same status as Basutoland and the Bechuanaland Protectorate. One effect of this will be the customs union preference on British goods by this territory. It has also been announced that articles 14 and 15 of the customs convention will apply to Northwestern Rhodesia. These articles contain technical provisions which were inserted to meet the requirements of Southern Rhodesia.

Closing the Shingle Mills.  
 Seattle, Wash., Dec. 1.—In accordance with an agreement signed by the owners of all the straight shingle mills of the Ballard district work in all these mills was stopped today and the mills will remain closed until March 1, 1906. This action was taken on account of the congested condition of the shingle market.

Back to Death Valley.  
 San Francisco, Dec. 1.—Walter Scott the Death Valley miner, has mysteriously disappeared from Barstow. He left his crutch behind, which he has used since his automobile accident. It is believed that he is broke, and has gone to Death Valley, to the location of his gold mine.

Chicago's Charter No Good.  
 Chicago, Dec. 1.—The circuit court today served an injunction against the city's appropriating funds for the municipal court system, holding the charter amendment act, passed by the last legislature, and adopted at the election in November, is unconstitutional.

Harry Eldridge Hanged.  
 Folsom, Cal., Dec. 1.—Harry Eldridge, convicted of the murder of Keeper W. L. Cotter during the jail break of July 27, 1903, was hanged this morning. His last words were: "You are hanging me because I kicked out of jail." He died game.

Steamer St. Denis Safe.  
 San Diego, Cal., Dec. 1.—The steamer St. Denis, of the Lower California coast trade, over which alarm was felt, arrived safely at Escondido this morning, and is due here tonight.

Union Pacific Train Wrecked.  
 Cheyenne, Wyo., Dec. 1.—The west-bound Union Pacific train was wrecked by a string of runaway cars near Green River, Wyo., and Engineer Albert Payne was killed.

Wants Branch Here.  
 H. H. Cohn, of the Vampire Cleaning Company, of Portland, is in the city today arranging to establish here a connection for his house. Mr. Cohn's company controls exclusive rights for the manufacture of clothes cleaning articles.

## SOCIALISTS ACTIVE IN GERMANY

Berlin, Dec. 1.—Socialist leaders urge German workmen to emulate Russia's and to parade in protest of the proposed increase in taxation. It is planned to issue an appeal to the workmen to strive manfully for freedom. The government is determined to suppress the movement.

Alcoholic Medicines Must Pay Tax.  
 Washington, D. C., Dec. 1.—Beginning with today alcoholic beverages, masquerading as patent medicines, are placed under the ban of taxation. Every manufacturer of "remedies" containing a large percentage of alcohol must pay a special tax as rectifiers and every person who sells such remedies must pay a liquor dealer's tax. The new order, which is based upon a ruling of John W. Yerks, commissioner of internal revenue, will be carried out with strictness, and the trade has been fully warned.

Italians Murdered in Chicago.  
 Chicago, Dec. 1.—The murder this morning of Guido Alexandro makes the fifth assassination of an Italian within 20 days. The murders are unexplained by the police unless the Mafia or some secret organization is responsible for them. Alexandro was waylaid by five men and shot through the heart twice.

Transfer of the Tennessee Central.  
 Nashville, Tenn., Dec. 1.—The transfer of the eastern section of the Tennessee Central of the Southern railroad and of the western section of the Illinois Central took place today and, it is understood, the work of improving the two sections will be begun at once.

## MUTINEERS BEATEN SURRENDER

St. Petersburg, Dec. 1.—According to the Slavo, the mutineers at Sevastopol themselves began the attack. After waiting until 3 o'clock in the afternoon for a reply to the demands of the mutineers, which included the convocation of a constituent assembly and the immediate realization of the reforms promised in the imperial manifesto. Lieutenant Schmidt opened fire on the city from ten vessels. Vice-Admiral Coukain replied from the loyal warships, and General Baron Meller Gakomelski from the southern forts and with the coast artillery. The mutinous sailors used rifles and machine guns upon the entrenched infantry.

Beaten in Heroic Struggle.  
 The fight, the Slavo says, lasted for two and a quarter hours. The mutineers made a heroic struggle, but the odds were too heavy, and, when the Otchakov, battered to pieces and on fire, sank, with the cruiser Dneiper and a transport, Lieutenant Schmidt, who was mortally wounded, surrendered the mutinous squadron, and the mutinous sailors on shore hauled down their flag to the Brest and Bielestok regiments.

According to the Russ, however, Admiral Coukain and General Gakomelski called on the mutineers to surrender, whereupon, under the orders of Lieutenant Schmidt, the mutinous vessels, which had replaced the flag of St. Andrew with a red flag, responded by hoisting the battle flag.

Northern Batteries Join Mutiny.  
 When the battle began the batteries on the north side, which were supposed to be loyal, instead of firing upon the mutineers, joined the cause with them and directed their fire upon the city and south side batteries. The Brest regiment thereupon stormed the northern batteries with fixed bayonets, and the guns were soon turned upon the ships and the barracks of the mutineers.

The Listok says the conspiracy which led to the mutiny went on under the noses of the officers, and that even Vice-Admiral Biriloff, the minister of marine, who was at Sevastopol a fortnight ago, suspected nothing. The sailors waited until they were assured of the support of the troops, most of whom, however, refused to go over to the mutineers when the die was cast.

Vice-Admiral Coukain was in command of the loyal vessels, some of which, including the Panteleimon, participated in the engagement. General Baron Meller Gakomelski, commander of the Seventh army corps, with 21,000 infantry and artillery, was in chief command ashore.

The battle ended at 5:30 this afternoon, when the ships of the mutineers surrendered. The Novosti says that 5000 men perished on both sides. The leaders of the mutineers, it is added, have already been executed, two battleships have been blown up and mines have been laid at the entrance of the roadstead.

Change in Postal Department.  
 Washington, D. C., Dec. 1.—The recent order of Postmaster General Corley defining the duties of the four assistant postmasters general went into effect at noon today. It is considered of great importance and will have tendency to consolidate the work of the department by grouping under one bureau all related subjects.

The result will be to place under the postmaster general's supervision the direction of the postal service; under the first assistant the postoffice personal and management; under the second assistants all matters relating to the transportation of the mails; under the third assistant all matters of postal finance; and under the fourth assistant the rural free delivery and miscellaneous postal business.

## WRECK NEAR TRUCKEE

 Truckee, Cal., Dec. 1.—At 1 o'clock this afternoon a freight train ran into a work train about eight miles east of Floriston, killing ten workmen and injuring nine. Truckee physicians, a railroad fire crew and a wreck train have left for the scene of the accident.

Cromwell at Head of Mutual.

 New York, Dec. 1.—President Frederick Cromwell, of the Mutual, began his regime by appointing W. E. Sullivan head of the advertising department to succeed A. C. Shields, who is badly wanted by the investigating committee. He also accepted the resignation of Charles J. Smith, head of the literary bureau.

Killed by Gas Explosion.

 Weston, W. Va., Dec. 1.—By an explosion early this morning the home of Charles Douglas was blown to pieces. Douglas and his wife and two children were torn to bits and cremated in the fire following. The valve blew out of a gas pipe near by, and filled the house with gas, which was ignited.
