TALKS ELECTRIC ROADS

Visits Eugene and Examines Into the Big Reservoir at That Place

Mr. A. Welch, of Lane County Electric company, yesterday came up from Salem and looked over part of the water works property recently purchased by Rhodes, Sinkler & Butcher of Philadelphia. He announced that plans and specifications are being prepared for the new reservoir on Skinner's butte and that work would be in progress within 60 days. The company is making preparations to sink additional wells to provide a sufficient supply of water for next summer.

The company is getting figures on filter plants to be installed as soon as possible. The filters under consideration are known as Jewell filters. Eugene water shows up remarkably well, showing no disease germs under the microscope, still some vegetable matter may be removed by filtration. Salem and Oregon City now have similar plants in successful operation.

Regarding an electric railroad to Springfield Mr. Welch said that the matter was still in abeyance. The company is bending its efforts toward getting its line between Salem and Portland into running order. Orders have been placed with an Omaha firm for 10 miles of 72 pound steel rails, to be used running north from Salem. The company expects to use 80-pound rails for the remainder of the line, but owing to the general scarcity of rails, they were able to get but the lighter weight. Orders are being placed with valley sawmills for ties, the Petzel mill, near Chemawa, having one contract for 10,000.

Mr. Welch met with the city council of Springfield and presented an offer from the Willamette Valley company put in a system of waterworks. The company is backed by Rhodes, Sinkler & Butcher of Philadelphia, the owners of the Eugene water and light plants. The Springfield council took the matter under advisement.
