SOURCE OF OPALS IN AUSTRALIA

Some of the finest opal known is obtained in the upper cretaceous formation at White Cliffs, near Wilcannia, New South Wales. During 1895 good stone was found at a depth of fifty feet and as the lower depths are reached the patches of opal appear to improve in quality and to become more regular and frequent. On one block a patch of stone was found which realized over \$15,000. It is difficult to state with exactitude the value of the production, but it is believed that stone to the value of \$43,885.00 has been sold up to the end of 1903. In 1901 a special commission was appointed to inquire into matters connected with the opal industry at White Cliffs, and their investigations tended to show that the annual value of production for some years had amounted to \$500,000. Despite the fact that operations were hampered in 1903 by lack of water the production for that year was valued at \$720,000. In 1903 the estimated value was \$500,000. Have Grown Some Since.

The service at the M. E. church yesterday morning was addressed by Rev. Selleck, Dr. W. C. Price and Professor Hawley.

Rev. Selleck described the first thanksgiving of the Pilgrim Fathers in 1621. Dr. Price spoke specially on God's dealing with nations, comparing the United States to the old Hebrew nation. Both were a number of states in one confederation, each had government by representation, in each officials were elected by the people, each had a written constitution, and each was founded on the establishment of judicial rights.

Professor Hawley took for his topic the new and advanced position of the United States. United States was the first nation to recognize neutrals in time of war and the rights of private property, the first to take a stand against privateering, and the first to recognize the rights of private property of belligerent nations.

European nations had failed in colonization, and the Monroe doctrine of the right of the western republics to mould their own destinies was a distinct step in advance of the rest of the world. In material things, the United States own one out of every fourteen acres of the earth's surface, had one out of every 17 of its people, one out of every nine tongues was spoken within its borders. In wealth, the United States owned one out of every four dollars in the world, had over half of all the money in all the banks of the world, owed one twenty-sixth of the public debt, had one-tenth of all the revenue, controlled one-tenth of all government expenditures and had the lightest taxation of any nation. Of all the gold coins in the world, this nation had one-fourth, and of silver coins one-sixth, while it mined one-fourth of the entire gold output.
