The cardinal doctrine of socialism is that the Socialist cannot be a patriot, that there are no national but merely party and class lines. Another equally important principle is that in case of war the Socialists oppose the government with the military strike. However, in light of recent events, one may see these two doctrines like that of a future communistic state, to pass. Are the Socialists backing war? Senor de Becon says that "in the Jena congress a Socialist, a former cavalry officer and an internationalist, told his fellows that 'it is necessary that we tell the government that we will not go to war.' But his vehement words had no echo—the congress replied to them with icy indifference and with unanimous silence. Another member suggested that the congress signify its indignation that M. Jaures was not allowed to go to Berlin. But there was no response to this motion. Again, Bernstein proposed that the government be censured for its passivity in the Morocco affair and during the Russo-Japanese war; but the Social Democracy refused en masse to blame the government for its foreign policy. The Socialists, however, replied to all of these motions by declaring that if the minister of war should order mobilization of the army they would seize their rifles and defend their country. Thus are the Germans as well as Socialists; or, rather, Germans before they are Socialists. The internationalism of Jaures and the French Socialist has passed away."—Public Opinion.

HAVE ETERNAL LIFE

Professor George Holmes Howison, head of the department of philosophy at the University of California, startled his class in ethics Tuesday morning by declaring that lower animals have eternal life as well as man. He took a fling at the theory of evolution, which supposes that conscious life evolved out of unconscious life, for, he said, consciousness existed in the beginning and will continue always to exist.

Professor Howison declared that Buddhism is ahead of Christianity in so far as its conception of the lower animals goes. "That animals have no souls, and were made by God for the pleasure and benefit of man is absurd," said Professor Howison. "The difference in intellect between man and the lower animals consists in the difference in the hindrance to the intellectual faculty. Increased intelligence means increased control. Do animals reflect? Undoubtedly they do. If they reflect, then they have intelligence. Once you admit that they have intelligence, then you must admit that they exist eternally, just as we do. Are animals capable of overcoming the hindrance to their intellectual faculty? I answer yes.

The world has one religion that has recognized the dignity of the lower animals. The remarkable thing about the Christian religion is the fact that it pays so little attention to the lower animals. Christ scarcely mentions them. Buddha surpassed him in this regard. And Buddha had absolutely no conception of the immortality of the soul and the dignity of individual life. In this Christ transcended him. Christ's word on the immortality of the soul is final."

In concluding his remarks on the subject of animals, Professor Howison stated that the highest forms of civilization would all come to recognize the immortality of the lower animal. The various societies for the prevention of cruelty to animals, he said, are a step in the right direction.—San Francisco Chronicle.
