STATE NEWS

All signs of smallpox have disappeared from Eugene, and the patients have all recovered.

Company A, of Eugene, are making great preparations to give their annual masquerade ball the Friday before New Years.

Walter Combs has been elected president of the Eugene high school student body, since the resignation of Arthur Pender.

Shade Steadham, of Oregon City, a timberman, was accidentally killed by a falling tree Saturday evening, near Cottage Grove.

Preparations are well under way toward building the gas works and reservoir at Eugene. Bids for construction will be asked for in a few days. The new reservoir will have a capacity of 1,000,000 gallons.

Charles E. M. Brown, died at his home three miles west of Eugene Wednesday evening. He was formerly a leading merchant of Eugene. He was also a prominent member of several lodges and of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Eugene.

Deputy Sheriff Bowen arrested Chas. Lynch at Springfield Tuesday, for stealing gold ore from the Oregon Securities Company, of the Bohemia mines. Lynch was the mine foreman, and was in the habit of reserving the richest pieces of ore found.

Steps are being taken at the University to do away with the annual class cap rush between the freshmen and sophomore classes, and to that end the freshmen have agreed to not wear the caps. If they can be assured that the freshmen class of next year will not have the caps either.

Manager Stower, of the University of Oregon football team, has not yet completed his financial report of the season, but it is estimated that there will be a surplus of over \$400. From a financial standpoint, the season was a great success, and the debt which the Associated Students were carrying will be paid off before the end of the present semester.

In fact, the longer they played the better the lawyers seemed to play. In the last half of the game they made nine points to their opponents' seven. A large crowd of students was present, and the only accident that marred the game happened when "Slim" Unruh slipped and strained his trousers to such an extent that he was compelled to make a hurried exit, which he did by gracefully bowing himself out.
