RALLY FOR OREGON NURSERY CO.

Commercial Club and Salem Business Men Asked to Meet Tonight

The directors of the Greater Salem Commercial Club have decided to call a special meeting of that organization, and of Salem business men at the police court room at 7:30 this evening to consider the need of the Oregon Nursery Co., and see what can be done to keep that industry in this city.

The Oregon Nursery Co. has next to the largest payroll in Salem, and the

loss of this industry would be a serious disaster. Securing a suitable ground and lease means another \$10,000 improvement for our city.

The club will also take up the matter of properly celebrating beginning of construction work on the Willamette valley railroad from Salem to Portland. That important event takes place Monday morning.

CHEMAWA STUDENTS BURGLARS

George Crane, an Indian from Chemawa, was captured this morning in the house of Thomas Kay, Twelfth and State streets. After rousing and struggling with one of the young lady inmates of the house, Crane tried to enter Mrs. Kay's apartments. Everyone was aroused by this time and the screams of the women brought out the neighbors who surrounded the dwelling, armed with guns and clubs. Chief of Police Cornelius was summoned. He entered the house, where he found everyone excited and almost overcome by fright, and the Indian behind a piece of furniture.

Another Indian was a partner in the attempted crime, but he effected his escape. He, however, is known to the police. The whole affair was as daring an attempt at robbery as was ever made in this city.

While in the sleeping apartments of one of the young ladies in the house, the pair were discovered. They seized the young woman, and threatened her, finally forcing her to indicate the apartment occupied by Mrs. Kay. The girl's shrieks, however, awakened the household, who, quickly discovering the cause of the excitement, joined in the outcry.

Neighbors heard the cry, and J. M. Long, who lives in the adjoining house, and several others surrounded the Kay house. Long was armed with a revolver, as were some of the others. They were not on the scene soon enough, though, to prevent the escape of one of the bold burglars. Crane found that he could not get away without risking the shots of the men surrounding the house. He accordingly hid behind a piece of furniture in one of the sleeping rooms, and there he was found by Chief Cornelius.

The purpose of the Indians was undoubtedly robbery. They were discovered in the house about 5:30 a. m., and had probably not been inside more than a few minutes. It is believed that they unlocked the back door by means of a key which they had in some way procured.

They had evidently mistaken the room in which they were discovered for the apartment of Mrs. Kay, where they seemed to think they could find valuables. When the girl sleeping in the room was aroused, they seized her and prevented her from crying out. They then threatened her and demanded that she tell them where Mrs. Kay's room was. As soon as they released the girl, she commenced to scream. One of the Indians immediately ran down the hall and out of the house. He has not been seen since.

Crane is a student of the school at Chemawa. He came into town last night with a number of other boys from the school. It is thought that he selected the Kay house for robbery, because he was in a way acquainted with the place. The family occasionally employ an Indian girl as a domestic, and from one of these girls Crane may have learned the plan of the house, and the chance of a profitable haul. He will be charged with burglary.

The other Indian who was concerned in the burglarious attempt on the Kay house was arrested late this morning at Chemawa by the city police. He has been identified, and is now in jail. The pair will be arraigned before Justice of the Peace Turner this afternoon.

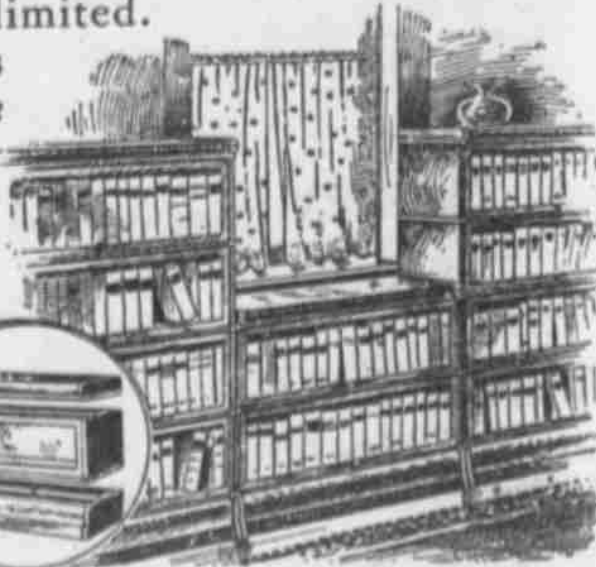

STUDIES TANBARK

Washington, D. C., Dec. 8.—Professor Willis L. Jepson, of the University of California, a collaborator with the forest service, is now in Europe where, in connection with university work, he is devoting special attention to a study of the tanbark industry in European countries, for the purpose of obtaining a broader view of the tanning industry of the Pacific coast, which the forest service is investigating. A chief point in his study abroad will be the

effort to determine the value and sources of the tanning materials which Pacific coast tanners derive by importation from European sources. Not only will statistics be gathered, but a comparison will be made of the qualities of leather obtained from domestic and imported tanning extracts, with a view of finding and recommending for use on the Pacific coast the best methods of tan bark production, and especially of extension and maintenance of present resources, in order that the home supply of bark may be so conservatively used as to make importation unnecessary.

The tan bark oak of the Pacific coast which is preeminently the west American source of tanning material, has

been so severely cut that despite its wide distribution and its once plentiful supply there is increasing danger of its early exhaustion.
