Will Endorse State Health Officer. Beaumont, Tex., Dec. 13.—The South Texas District Medical association began its annual convention here today and several hundred members of the organization from the southern and southeastern parts of the state are in attendance. Many important matters of interest to the medical fraternity will be considered during the convention and it is believed that the question in regard to the prevention of yellow fever epidemics will be one of the most important subjects for discussion.

It is believed that the convention will warmly endorse the action and methods of Dr. George R. Tabor, the state health officer of Texas, who prevented the spread of yellow fever in Texas by maintaining a strict and rigorous quarantine. This is quite significant, as the health officer has been severely criticized by some of the newspapers of Louisiana and other southern states.
