BEST LAID PLANS.

Dress Rehearsal at the Asylum, Pleases the Patients.

For two hours last evening the patients at the asylum enjoyed themselves as few of them have done for years. The occasion was the dress rehearsal of "Best Laid Plans" and "A Regular Fix," which are to be given Monday night, by local talent, at the Grand Opera House. Both plays went off without a hitch, and the patients and attendants thoroughly enjoyed every minute of the performance. The music by the asylum orchestra was also of a high order, and added much to the pleasure of the evening's entertainment.

Ralph Bader, as the English lord, was at his best, and his work would be worthy of many who make greater pretensions. With his "makeup," and the successful carrying out of his character, it is doubtful if his own mother would have known him. He was ably sustained by Mary Saloman, Olive Riddell and Olive Rigby, as three charming American girls; Mrs. Wycherly, as the hospitable housewife, and by Wallace Trill, Ralph Matthews and Ronald Glover, as the three young men who propose to punish the girls for neglecting them for an Englishman.

While there is not so much to the "Regular Fix," from a dramatic standpoint, the audience last night was kept in one almost continuous roar of laughter from the time the curtain went up until it came down, late it is true, but "better late than never." Many times during the performance the characters were compelled to wait until the laughter had subsided before they could make themselves heard.

The scene opened with Miss Morris, as the pretty little housemaid, Matilda Jones, making tidy her master's parlor, the morning after a "house ball." Hardly had she discovered the sleeping DeBross until Miss Byars, as the typical English housekeeper puts in an appearance, and shows her master hand. As they are called from the room DeBross awakens to find himself in a chair in another man's house, without knowing who or what the man is, and without knowing how he came to be there. That is only the beginning of his troubles, however, for those that come after would make the troubles of a common man pale into insignificance. When the wife of the master of the house, represented by Miss Gussie Booth, who has fallen in love with DeBross, attempts to save him from the wrath of her husband, who, in this case, is Roy Hewitt, and falls fainting into his arms, as the husband enters, then there is "something doing."

Other characters who serve to make the plot interesting are Emily, the adopted daughter of the master of the house, Mr. Charles Surplus, his nephew, and Abel Quick, his head clerk, together with Smiler, bailiff, who wishes to arrest DeBross for non-payment of debts. These characters are respectively taken by Ione Fisher, Elmo White and Jonas Jorstead.

These plays will be presented by the above named University students at the opera house this evening, as a football benefit. The price of seats will be 50 and 35 cents.
