It will be seen that the campaign of 1906 really begins during the last week in December of this year, when initiative petitions must be filed if the promotors desire to file pamphlets in support of the proposed measures. The fice of Secretary of State Dunbar by December 30. If the promoters of measures do not desire to file pamphlets, they will have until February 3 to file petitions,

It should also be explained that petitions for nominations for district offices, such as circuit judge, district attorney, joint senator and joint representative, must be filed in the office of the secretary of state, and not in the offices of the county clerks, and the dates governing nominations for state offices are applicable. The following list contains all the dates of interest to the voter and the candidate for office:
