A case of smallpox is reported from Pleasant Hill, near Eugene.

James W. Arnold died at his home in Eugene Sunday aged 67 years.

Another house has been quarantined at Eugene, Miss Mazy Eddy being the victim.

Gus Perret has been elected captain of the Eugene high school football team for 1906.

The receipts of the U. of O. football team this year were \$3800, the expenses \$3200, leaving \$634 in the treasury.

W. Lair Thompson, of Albany, has been engaged as one of the officials in the Multnomah-Salem football game next Monday.

Stephen Mead, a 13-year-old boy, living on Indian Creek, near Eugene, was accidentally shot through the hip while hunting Sunday afternoon.

The little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Phipps, of Ashland, aged 4 years, died suddenly Saturday evening from paralysis of the heart, caused by ptomaine poisoning.

A gasoline schooner is being constructed at Coos Bay for use on the Siuslaw. The craft will be 144 feet long, and will have two gasoline engines with 105 horse power each.

Jack Layton, a pioneer of Southern Oregon, and one of the best known placer miners on the coast, dropped dead in the diggings of his William creek hydraulic mines Thursday afternoon. He was 72 years old, and the cause of his death was heart failure.

An injunction suit against the city of Eugene, as a corporation, the members of the city council, the city recorder and city treasurer, to restrain them from issuing bonds recently voted for municipal ownership of light and water plants, and to declare the election illegal and void has been filed in the circuit court there.
