SENATORS BY THE DIRECT VOTE OF THE PEOPLE.

The Journal has received a great deal of commendation for its editorial stand in favor of election of United States senators by the direct vote of the people at the nominating primary election and the Australian ballot.

This proposition has received no commendation FROM THE BOSSES OR THE NEWSPAPERS CONTROLLED BY THE BOSSES.

Many voters from the country and many of the best Republicans and Democrats and Socialists and Prohibitionists of this city and county have called at this office and expressed their approval of our position.

The bosses thought that because we did not favor this law when it was adopted, because we did not like some features of it, and because we had nothing to do with getting up the bill, THAT WE WOULD PLAY THEIR GAME AND HELP NULLIFY ITS PROVISIONS in regard to electing United States senators by the direct vote of the people.

The adoption of the honest intent and purpose of the direct primary law, and carrying out its spirit, would put an end to the disgraceful scenes of the past and put the election of senators IN THE HANDS OF THE PEOPLE, WHERE IT BELONGS.

There are minor defects in this primary law that we would like to see remedied, but the great principle of protection to the government embodied in the provision for electing senators should not be slaughtered at the hands of the bosses of Marion county or any other county.

The delegation from Marion county should not be an Ike Patterson delegation, nor an Ed Croisan delegation, nor a Col. Hofer delegation, but should be a delegation PLEDGED TO STAND LIKE A SOLID WALL for the people's choice for United States senator.

We have high regard for the opinions of others and believe that every man should have the right to his own opinion and to express it freely.

The Salem Statesman on Saturday, Dec 21, has an editorial taking the position on this subject that candidates should not be asked to take the first pledge in the primary law. Let us quote the Statesman verbatim on this all-important matter:

It is doubtful, therefore, WHETHER IT WILL BE WISE for voters to insist on candidates for the legislature TO AGREE TO THE FIRST STATEMENT OF THIS LAW, that is to say, the one which would bind them if elected to the legislature, to "always vote for that candidate for United States senator in congress."

WHO HAS RECEIVED THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF VOTES polled for that position at the general election next preceding the election of a senator in congress without regard to my individual preference. We believe it better, rather, to USE DUE DILLIGENCE AND CARE IN THE SELECTION OF NOMINEES FOR THE LEGISLATURE, leaving them free to act under the second statement in which they are permitted to consider the vote of the people for senator in congress AS A RECOMMENDATION WHICH THEY SHALL BE AT LIBERTY TO DISREGARD if the reason seem sufficient.

The Statesman thinks the voters should not insist on the voter asking the representative he sends to the general assembly to give any pledge to respect the choice of the people on United States senator.

THE VOTER WILL BE ASKED ON THE AUSTRALIAN BALLOT TO EXPRESS HIS OWN CHOICE FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR but the man the voter elects as his representative SHOULD BE OBLIGED TO CONSIDER THE VOTER'S CHOICE.

Then what becomes of the principle of the delegated authority and the principle of representative government?

What is the sense in asking the voter to express himself as to who shall be United States senator as the law requires, AND THEN HAVE THAT CHOICE NULLIFIED by the man who goes to the legislature?

What does it all mean but that our legislature shall be further disgraced by sending men there to barter and trade away their votes under the dictation of machine pressure or personal enterprise?

It is well known that men go to the legislature and seek to go there TO TRADE THEIR VOTE ON UNITED STATES SENATOR FOR A FEDERAL OFFICE, and very unfit and incompetent men get into the federal offices in that way.

The "system" that has filled the United States senate with the cheap hirelings of the trusts never got a harder blow than by the little Oregon primary law, if the people use their rights under that law.

The time has come to use that right. The people should go to the primaries as never before and strike the first blow to liberate the senate of the United States from the thralldom of the trusts.

The state of Oregon will set the pace for the cleaning of the Augean stables by turning the river of pure ballots direct from the uncontaminated voters through that institution.

The man does not live who can go before the people and ask their franchise for the express purpose of disregarding their expressed choice on any important matter. They think they can but instead of fooling the people the politicians who attempt to trick or nullify this law will themselves be fooled.

Do not be deceived. The direct primary is not minority rule. It is only a process of elimination, giving the people a chance to sift out the man they want as their candidate in each party.

Several Republicans will go before the people for the direct nomination. Several Democrats will do the same. One from each party will be nominated and will become the party candidate.

The candidates of the two parties will go before the people again at the general election and make their campaigns before the people and the people will take them at their word AND THE PEOPLE WILL DO THE VOTING.

Who wants the right to disregard the will of the people properly and legitimately and legally expressed?

Is it not the class of men who have trafficked in the legislature with the rights and interest of the people until the legislature has become almost a byword for ridicule?

Is it not time to put into practical application what has been so long advocated and talked about and promised the people—election of senators by the direct vote of the people?

Direct nomination and election by the people may not work perfectly but it cannot bring any worse results than we have had under the old system, that has become a mockery.

Under the direct primary system how can the great insurance trusts that have spent so much money in political debauchery, by their own confession, GET THEIR WORK IN ON THE PEOPLE OF OREGON?

The new method of nominating and electing senators will simply make that impossible.

Three-fourths of the time of the legislature will not be consumed in a deadlock OVER WHO SHALL BE THE NEXT UNITED STATES SENATE DISPENSER OF PATRONAGE. The people will settle that matter and instead of paying campaign bills with postoffices and land offices and customs collectors and free rural carriers, the appointments will be more on merit.

THE LEGITIMATE BUSINESS OF THE PEOPLE WILL BE BETTER ATTENDED TO IF THEY ATTEND TO A LITTLE OF THEIR OWN LEGITIMATE BUSINESS FIRST IN THE RIGHT MANNER.

Begin right. Send no man to the legislature who will not respect the will of the people properly and honestly and fairly expressed. The rest will take care of itself if we keep our finger on the trigger.

THE LESSON OF HORACE MCKINLEY.

There ought to be an impressive lesson to parents and young people in the career of Horace McKinley, now a fugitive from justice on account of land frauds.

Born of respectable, well to do parents, well educated, naturally bright and clever, the young man married and started in life favorably.

HE HAD EVERY ADVANTAGE, APPARENTLY, to inspire confidence. His father was a successful lumberer at West Salem, Wisconsin. His family were Presbyterians. The young man was a Republican. He had strong financial backing at La Crosse, Wisconsin.

The banks and the capitalists east and west trusted in Horace McKinley. Horace was good hearted, well disposed, good looking and successful in his methods.

THEN WHAT HAS CAUSED HIS DOWNFALL?

How could he engage in flagrant frauds, deceptions, violations of law and morals that makes him a hunted criminal today, under conviction, fleeing from his victims.

What was the fatal defect in this individual's composition, in his equipment for life, that led to his downfall, when he had so many advantages?

What weakness in his moral makeup undermined all the good foundations that, ordinarily, should have produced success?

An individual is no stronger than his equipment—but how, personally, mentally, morally, spiritually? Well, the weakness may be in any respect, BUT MORE ESPECIALLY THE LAST.

All rests finally on the spiritual equipment of the man? What are all our churches, our Sunday schools, our Y. M. C. A.s for but to make the latter quality appear in the man or woman.

Without the spiritual awakening, THAT RESULTS IN A CONSCIENCE THAT WARNS THE INDIVIDUAL, "thus far and no farther," he is safely guided even by the moral nature.

Horace McKinley's Presbyterian training had not soaked in sufficiently deep to give him the power of resistance to evil thinking and wrong doing, the temptation that assailed every man sooner or later.

A certain training and development of character in the home or the church or the school must be made to reach the vital spot, and THERE MUST BE THAT QUICKENING OF THE SPIRIT which results in an essential honesty of the individual, or all the rest is mere veneering and will not stand the strain of actual life.

THE BRITISH POLITICAL SITUATION.

Campbell-Bannerman has organized a ministry with distinctly radical leanings. BESIDES BEING A FREE TRADE MINISTER and hostile to the use of educational funds it is clearly in harmony with the prime minister on the question of land value taxation. The lines are well drawn, therefore, for a contest before the people as the approaching general elections on the three burning issues—the educational question, the tariff question and the question of taxing land values. The campaigning will probably begin early in the year, and Chamberlain counts on electing enough members to hold the balance of power.

Having resigned responsible office, Arthur J. Balfour, the recent prime minister, is now leader of the Opposition. The campaign will probably open early in January and last for six weeks or so. It will be the effort of the Conservatives to confine the issue to tariff questions. The Liberal party will insist that the poverty of Great Britain, now widespread and acute, is due, not to too much free trade, as explained by the protectionists, but to too little. They will, therefore, urge the extension of free trade principles to production generally, by abolishing or reducing taxes on industry and levying taxes and land values.

THE TAXATION PROBLEM.

Portland newspapers and citizens complain that if there is over five mills city tax levied THAT CITY CANNOT PROSPER.

That is a good argument. But can the state prosper and develop with a six and two-tenths mills state tax? DRAW YOUR OWN CONCLUSION.

The Portland property owner howls and throws up his hands and says, our city cannot go forward with 5.8 mills city tax.

But the levy of 6.3 mills state tax on all the farms and homes outside of Portland ought to STILL MORE IMPEDE STATE GROWTH.

The truth is, Portland will grow and the state of Oregon will grow, in spite of these high tax levies.

But the time has come to wipe out the high state tax. THE PEOPLE SHOULD DO THIS.

The bill recommended by the Carson committee will do it.

THAT BILL, if enacted by the people, without the interference of a corporation-ridden legislature, WILL DO IT.

It will wipe out half the state tax on property the first year it goes into effect.

It will produce an increasing volume of state revenue each year until in a few years there will be no need of levying any state tax whatever. THEN THE STATE WILL PROSPER AND DEVELOP FASTER THAN EVER BEFORE.

That bill will be ready for petitions in a few days.

Tax Revision Leagues will be organized to discuss the bill and secure the signatures to initiate it.

DON'T WAIT FOR THE LEGISLATURE, CITIZENS. You will get new burdens, impose new taxes and no relief there. Legislatures enact new burdens, impose new taxes, create new offices, pass new appropriations.

SUSTAIN GOOD SERVICE.

The people of Salem have sustained one principle pretty faithfully—that appointive officials who are doing good and faithful service should not be removed at the whim and caprice of machine influence.

Whenever school teachers have been dropped from their places WHEN THERE WAS NO APPARENT CAUSE, but solely under pressure for places, the people have shown resentment.

On the same principle employees in the city government have been retained when administrations have changed, and the best men in the police and fire departments have continued in their places.

The present police force was continued under the Republican city administration, and has met the expectations of the business interests of the city and given almost universal satisfaction. For the number of men employed no city has a more thoroughly efficient police force than Salem.

The proposal to make changes in the service with no intention of bettering the service, but merely to make places

for friends, is the out growth of pressure for places.

If better men can be found for places in the police and fire departments, IF THERE IS GENERAL DISSATISFACTION WITH ANY INCUMBENT, a change may be justifiable, but not otherwise. If vacancies are to be made regardless of merit, no good public service is possible. No one is secure.

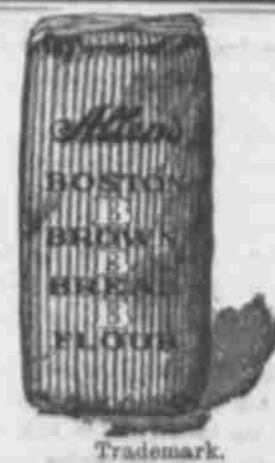
