EXCURSION TO CALIFORNIA.

Under Auspices of the Oregon Development League Leaves Portland on Special Train January 13th.

Secretary Tom Richardson, of the Oregon Development League, is very anxious that the state at large should be well represented on this excursion. The party, which will be composed of ladies and gentlemen, leaves Portland at midnight, January 13, 1906, stops being made at Sacramento, San Francisco, Palo Alto, San Jose, Paso Robles, Santa Barbara and Los Angeles. Special entertainment will be accorded the party at these points. The rate from Portland will be \$63 for one person, which includes three meals to be served on dinner between Portland and Sacramento, and Pullman berth to Los Angeles. A rate of \$58 will be charged where two people occupy a double berth. A deposit of \$25 is necessary on each ticket to secure reservation. Section reservations will be held until December 25th. This is an excellent opportunity to visit California, as the auspices under which it is given insures a most enjoyable outing.

LEADING BUSINESS MEN

Not an Aggregation of Kickers in the Valley League

(J. F. Words in Washington County News.)

The Willamette Valley Development league is not an aggregation of kickers, as some would have the public think, but a voluntary organization of all classes of men that believe Oregon should be exploited, developed and improved for the benefit of Oregonians now residing here and those who are to come, and that the railroads should keep up with the procession in that development, and that a portion of the millions earned by them in this state the past few years should be expended for extensions and betterments of their lines in this state. It does not believe in radical legislation or stringent measures but it has faith in the sound sense and good judgment of the railway magnates to believe that they will accede to the reasonable requests of the producers and shippers of this country and give them such extensions, new lines and improved service as the business demands.

The Willamette Valley Development league from a small beginning less than one year ago has grown to be the most powerful and influential organization of its kind on the North Pacific coast. The idea was first conceived in McMinnville and took concrete form at Salem, where the first public meeting was held, and from thence to the present it has been making for itself a place in the thought and act of a constantly growing number of leading business men of the entire valley. Through influences set in motion by it much has been gained that is real and tangible, from the Harriman system of railways—the construction of the line from Drain to Coos Bay, for instance. Better car and train service has also been obtained in some parts of the valley. The league has come to stay and if the future can be judged by the past, it will grow in influence not only with the farmers and shippers of this valley, but with the leading business men of all western Oregon.

The next convention will be held at Albany January 24-25.

STATE TEACHERS CONVENTION

White and Colored Educators Are Assembled in Many Places

New York, Dec. 27.—The annual meeting of the New York State Teachers' association, which will open at the high school this evening, marks the 60th anniversary of the organization. The attendance promises to be unusually large. At the opening meeting to-night Superintendent J. M. Thompson, president of the Academic Principals' association, will preside. Chancellor James B. Day, of Syracuse University, will deliver the address of welcome. Other welcoming addresses will be delivered by Superintendent A. B. Blodgett, of the Syracuse public schools and others. Superintendent F. D. Boynton, president of the New York Teachers' association, will deliver his annual address and will speak on "Needed Educational Legislation." Howard J. Rogers, first assistant commissioner of education, will also deliver an address. The meeting of the association will last three days and in that time there will be daily union meetings as well as sectional and departmental sessions devoted to the consideration of various educational branches.

Atlantic City, N. J., Dec. 27.—The New Jersey State School Teachers' association met at the high school this morning for a three days' session. The evening sessions of the associations will be held at the St. Paul's Methodist church. This session is of considerable importance, as matters of great interest will come up for consideration. The question of the management of the teachers' retirement fund is expected to cause a heated debate in the meeting, as there is considerable dissatisfaction in regard to the management of the fund among the teachers. It is even considered possible that this matter may cause a split in the association.

Miami, Fla., Dec. 27.—Teachers from all parts of the state are here to attend the annual meeting of the Florida State Teachers' association, which will open here tonight. The Hon. Mitchell D. Price will deliver the address of welcome on behalf of the city and Prof. W. W. Hall, principal of the Miami high school on behalf of the teachers of the city. Superintendent J. W. McClung of Tampa, Fla., will respond and President A. A. Murphree will deliver his annual address. The meeting will last three days and many prominent educators will deliver addresses.

Jefferson City, Mo., Dec. 27.—Governor Folk delivered the address of welcome at the opening of the 44th annual meeting of the Missouri State Teachers' association this morning. President C. E. Miller responded and delivered his annual address. The attendance is unusually large.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 27.—One of the most interesting features of the 52nd annual convention of the Indiana State Teachers' association, which will open here this evening, will be a meeting on Thursday afternoon in Tamlinson hall, devoted to the memory of James Whitcomb Riley. A special program has been arranged for that meeting and handsome souvenirs will be given out. The teachers' convention will last three days and during that time there will also be a convention of the county superintendents and various sectional conferences.

Lansing, Mich., Dec. 27.—Several noted educators from other states have arrived here to deliver addresses before the annual meeting of the Michigan State Teachers' association, which opens its sessions here today. The attendance is very large and an interesting program has been prepared.

Milwaukee, Wis., Dec. 27.—Several thousand teachers from all parts of the state have registered for the annual meeting of the State Teachers' association, which opened here today. Among the prominent educators who are here and will address the meeting are Miss Julia C. Lathrop, of Hull House, Chicago; William L. Tomline, of Chicago, who will speak on "Music as a Vitalizing Force in Education;" Prof. M. S. Slaughter, J. Q. Emery, C. P. Cary and others.

St. Paul, Minn., Dec. 27.—The annual meeting of the Minnesota Educational association opened here this morning at the Central Presbyterian church. State Superintendent J. W. Olson, Governor John A. Johnson and Frank A. Weld, the president of the association, were the principal speakers. At the session this evening the Rev. Dr. Frank W. Gunsaulus of Chicago will deliver an address on "Gladstone." The meeting will last three days.

Canada's Dairy Exports.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 27.—Consul General Holloway of Halifax, N. S., reports that the shipments of cheese last year exceeded those of any previous year in Canada's history. There were shipped 2,634,767 boxes of that commodity, which, at the average price of 10 cents a pound, representing upwards of \$21,000,000. Butter shipments amounted to 701,803 packages, which, at the average price of 21½ cents, represents \$8,412,000.
