More Diversified Farming.

Mr. E. D. Severance, of the Baker
City and Haines creameries, was in
Eagle valley this week and made
final arrangements for the establish-
ment of a creamery in Richmond. The
proposition meets with the enthu-
siastic support of the farmers of Eagle
valley and they have pledged them-
selves to supply the creamery with
milk from 300 cows, commencing on
March 1, 1907. Mr. Severance paid
a visit, also, to Pine valley, and while
there purchased the creamery at Half-
way.—Baker City Democrat.

Ontario Booming.

Last Wednesday evening the Ontario
city council granted to Seymour H.
Bell, a well known Sumpter promoter,
a ten-year franchise for the installation
of a water system, on which he pro-
poses to spend \$65,000, the work to be
completed within a year. As a guar-
antee of his good faith Mr. Bell de-
posited with the city a check of \$500.

At the same council meeting steps
were taken toward the installation of
a sewer system and a proposition to bond
the city for \$25,000 for this purpose
will be submitted to the voters of On-
tario very shortly.

A proposition is also on foot for the
removal of the county seat from Vale
to Ontario, and a mass meeting was
held at the latter place last Thursday
evening, at which steps were taken to
have the proposition put before the
people of the county at the election next
June.—Huntington Herald.

Large Power Company.

Articles of incorporation were filed
with County Clerk Combs Thursday
afternoon by J. K. Romig, whereby
the Eagle River Electric Power com-
pany came into existence. The in-
corporators are Frank W. Paine, Jas.
K. Romig, John E. Bingham, Frank
A. Moore and W. M. Pearce. The cap-
ital stock is placed at \$500,000, divid-
ed into 5000 shares at a par value of
\$100 each. The objects of the com-
pany are very largely explained in the
title. It proposes to harness the Eagle
river and transmit it to points that
will have occasion to use the product.
The new company contains the names
of some very responsible men, who are
identified with other big propositions
in eastern Oregon.—Morning Democrat.

No Race Suicide in This

Union county cannot be accused of
race suicide by the strongest advocate
of that theory. From the time that
the law requiring all births be regis-
tered with the county court went into
effect, May 18, to December 1, there
have been 82 births registered; 46 fe-
males and 36 males.

Of these 82 births a trifle over 20
per cent were of Mormon parentage.
Race suicide is not predominant among
this set, as there are but from 1600 to
1800 of this denomination in Union
county. The large birth rate is com-
mon among the Mormons, many of them
having 10 and 12 living children.

According to the birth record, the
average family of Union is composed
of three children or thereabouts.—Morn-
ing Democrat.

WHO SHE WAS

SKETCH OF THE LIFE OF LYDIA E. PINKHAM
