JAPAN AND CHINA.

When Russia and Japan were adjusting their terms of peace at Portsmouth in July the Chinese government transmitted a note to the world powers intimating that no provision affecting China would be recognized by the Chinese government as valid without her prior approval; and an adjustment of the relations of China and Japan has now been made. As reported from Tokyo on the 14th, a treaty embodying the following terms has been perfected:

1. The lease of the Kwangtung peninsula will expire in 1923.
2. The railway south of Chang Chung will be handed over to Japan. China, however, will have the right to repurchase it in 1906, or earlier should the Russians relinquish the northern section of the road. Japan will not construct any branch lines.
3. Japan will be allowed to maintain railway garrisons.
4. Japan will evacuate Manchuria within eighteen months.
5. The military telegraphs will be treated in the same manner as the railway.
6. The sixth, seventh and eighth clauses provide for garrisoned consulates at New Chung, Mukden, Antung, Kirin, Chang Shung and other places, which are the residences of Japanese, and banking shall be restricted to those places.
7. The customs house will be maintained at New Chung. The customs hitherto collected by the Japanese shall be restored to China.
8. Coal mining shall be restricted to Suifu and Yantai.
9. The military notes issued by the Japanese shall be redeemed rapidly.
10. The Japanese military administration shall lapse with Japan's evacuation of Manchuria.

The Oregonian comments thus on the Commercial club resolutions:

"When the Greater Salem Commercial club resided in its resolutions that the Willamette Valley is as large as

the state of Connecticut, and that the looks at the falls at Oregon City maintain freight rates not only on the river but on the competing railroad, enough was shown to justify public ownership and control of the passage from the upper to the lower river. Elimination of the toll at the falls would not only reduce freight rates on steamboat traffic, but would reduce the charges on the railroad from all points within hailing distance of the river. The man who leads the movement resulting in government ownership of the looks at Oregon City will need no monument to perpetuate his memory in this state."

America's Coal.

Germany, 180,000,000 tons; Great Britain, 200,000,000 tons; United States, 352,000,000—these are the figures for the 1904 coal output of the three leading countries. In 1875 the United States produced 52,000,000 tons; Germany, 53,000,000, and Great Britain, 150,000,000. The increase of 30 years was 73 per cent for Great Britain, 250 per cent for Germany and 576 per cent for the United States.

Such is the report given by F. E. Seward, editor of the Coal Trade Journal, in an article which he contributes to the Engineering Magazine. It tells the story of America's advance in manufacturing as nearly as any raw material output can tell it. The early development of coal mining in Great Britain gave that country an easy lead in manufacturing for many decades, but now both Germany and the United States are gaining in manufactures as fast as they are advancing in their output of coal.

American anthracite mines yielded 74,000,000 tons last year; the bituminous mines, 278,000,000 tons. The industry employed 550,000 miners, besides 7,071 machines, which produced 79,000,000 tons. The bituminous miners have a practically uniform 8-hour day. In the anthracite fields few miners work more than five hours, and the loaders and common laborers work nine hours.

Twice during the last five years the pay of miners has been raised—10 per cent each time. The abolition of the truck system is estimated to be worth 10 per cent more. Only 21,000,000 tons of American coal was exported or used in coaling outward-bound steamships, while Great Britain shipped 73,000,000 tons. The coal mined in the United States equals in weight one-half the total of freight carried on American railways, but of course does not constitute one-half that freight, as much of the coal is shipped by water.—Tacoma Ledger.

La Grande invites all who are interested in the development of the West to attend this meeting, and promises every attention possible. Dowie's Downfall.

If the news contained in a late Chicago dispatch be true, the end of John Alexander Dowie's Zion City experiment is at hand. It is going the way of all the other illusions of the same kind. Dowie was a masterful man; but illness has now sapped his strength, and he has turned over the administration of Zion to a triumvirate. Zion's success was due solely to the strength of his individuality. When his native power began to wane the industries that he had originated and fostered dropped into idleness, until most of them are closed now. The population has dwindled from six thousand to three thousand, and the millions of dollars worth of property that Dowie administered with a marvelous skill is said to be mortgaged almost to the limit of its present value. Zion depended upon one man for its existence and vitality, and it is not difficult to forecast its dissolution with Dowie's departure.

EXCURSION TO CALIFORNIA.

Under Auspices of the Oregon Development League Leaves Portland on Special Train January 13th.

Each bid on flour or meat must be accompanied by a certified check of \$300.00, and each bid on fish by a certified check of \$75.00, and all other bids by certified checks equal to 10 per cent of the amount bid; checks of unsuccessful bidders to be returned immediately, and those of accepted bidders when the contract is completed. Bids must be enclosed in sealed envelopes and directed to the Board, care of the Clerk, and plainly marked, "Bids for Asylum Supplies," and the class of goods bid on should also be inscribed on the envelope. Price, fitness and quality being equal, preference will be given to articles manufactured, grown or produced in this state. When a particular article is specifically called for, bids for other kind, or manufacture, or brand, equally good will be entertained, but to insure recognition of such bids, samples of the articles it is proposed to supply must accompany them.

Bidders will take notice that there is no appropriation available for maintenance of the Asylum. Therefore, claims for supplies can only be audited by the Secretary of State and certificates of evidence of allowance issued to claimants. As soon as there is an appropriation available, warrants will be issued in lieu of the certificates.
