**Mr. Betsey M. Rook.**  
Mrs. Betsey M. Rook, died at the home of her son, P. C. Levar, at Marshfield, Oregon, December 29, 1905, aged 72 years, 3 months and 25 days. Mrs. Rook was well known in this city, where she resided for many years. Her maiden name was Betsey Mari Chan, and she was born in Corinth, Maine, September 4, 1833. She was married to John Levar in 1857, and they lived in Orono, Maine, for ten

years, when, in 1868, they came to the Pacific coast by way of the Isthmus of Panama. They first settled in Humboldt county, California, where Mr. Levar went into the logging business. In 1875 they came to Coos county, where they lived at Sumner for a number of years. Mr. Levar died in 1886. In 1890 Mrs. Levar was married to Rev. John H. Rook, of Salem, and they came here to reside. Rev. Rook was pastor of the Leslie M. E. church for many years. He died February 18, 1895. Mrs. Rook continued to live in this city until 1900, when she went to Marshfield to live with her son, P. C. Levar. Her health was generally excellent until about two years ago, when she was seriously ill. Since then she failed gradually, until the end came, she was a lifelong member of the Methodist church, and has scores of friends in this city. The funeral was held yesterday at Marshfield.

**EXCURSION TO CALIFORNIA.**  
Under Auspices of the Oregon Development League Leaves Portland on Special Train January 13th.

Secretary Tom Richardson, of the Oregon Development League, is very anxious that the state at large should be well represented on this excursion. The party, which will be composed of ladies and gentlemen, leaves Portland at midnight, January 13, 1906, stops being made at Sacramento, San Francisco, Palo Alto, San Jose, Paso Robles, Santa Barbara and Los Angeles.
