Leaves the Deaf Mute School.

Prof. Thos. P. Clarke, who has been superintendent of the Oregon school for deaf mutes, yesterday handed in his resignation to the board, in order to accept a similar position at the Washington state school for the blind and deaf mutes together. The resignation came as quite a surprise to Mr. Clarke's many friends in Salem, who had been given no warning that he expected to make a change. Mr. Clark has been at the head of the Salem school for three years and a half, and at all times has given the best of satisfaction. It was with reluctance that his resignation was accepted.

To fill the vacancy caused by the resignation, Mr. E. S. Tillinghast, of Vancouver, was elected superintendent. Mr. Tillinghast is at present head teacher in the Washington school, and was formerly superintendent of the Montana state school. He has had many years' experience in the teaching of deaf mutes, and the board feels that it has been fortunate in securing a good, well equipped man for the place. Mr. Tillinghast, like his predecessor, is a native of North Carolina, and comes of a family who has made the teaching of unfortunate their life work. When in college he shaped his course so as to prepare himself for his chosen field of labor, and entered into it with vigor immediately upon graduation.

COTTON PLANTERS ORGANIZE

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 3.—The state convention of the delegates elected by the cotton planters of this state for the purpose of selecting members of the executive committee, which is the governing body of the Southern Cotton Growers' association, meets here today. The meeting will be held at the state capitol. On January 10 the members of the executive committee who are elected by the state conventions here and in other states, will meet at Hot Springs, Ark., for the purpose of deciding upon the plan of campaign for the coming season. It is announced as practically certain that the present president and secretary will be re-elected. In regard to the policy to be pursued by the association next season President Harvie Jordan has stated that he did not think that any further reduction would be advised. In his opinion the acreage should be about the same as during last year.

On the same day on which the executive committee will meet in Hot Springs, there will be a mass meeting of persons in the south interested in cotton, in New Orleans. The convention will be one of the largest and most important meetings ever held in the south and will undoubtedly attract wide interest. In a large measure it will be a love feast, celebrating the success of the movement for higher prices, which was started in New Orleans in January of last year, when the Southern Cotton association was formed. The convention will not be a meeting of the association proper, but will be open to all who are in some way interested in the growing or marketing of cotton.

In some quarters it is believed that the Southern Cotton association will decide to tie up what cotton there is left in the south at the present time and hold it until the price of cotton reaches the fifteen cents mark. It is said that the success of this movement is almost assured. It is expected that about 2,000,000 bales of cotton will be tied up, if the cotton association should so decide.

Tell How to Make Cheese.

Shewaukee, Wis., Jan. 2.—The annual convention of the Wisconsin Cheesemakers' association, which opened here this morning at the Republican house, is the best attended and most enthusiastic ever held in this state. The members were welcomed at the opening session this morning by B. B. Watson, of this city. W. C. Thomas, of Sheboygan Fall, responded on behalf of the visiting members. Then President E. L. Alderhold, of Neenah, delivered his annual address. After the various officers of the organization had submitted their annual reports, a number of interesting papers on cheese making, various phases of the cheese and dairy industry, and similar subjects were read. There will be another meeting in the afternoon. The convention will last three days and will hold two meetings every day. At the same time an interesting exhibit of various kinds of cheese is held.

Merger of Women's Associations.

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 2.—An important proposition will be considered at the annual meeting of the Y. W. C. A., which opened here today. It is nothing less than the proposition of forming a merger with the Women's Christian association. The Y. W. C. A. was organized in 1854 as the result of a split in the mother organization, the Women's Christian association. Since then the young association has met with remarkable success, while the mother organization remained practically at a standstill. It is expected that the merger of the two organizations will be of great benefit to both associations, and will enable them to carry on their work with greater success than heretofore.

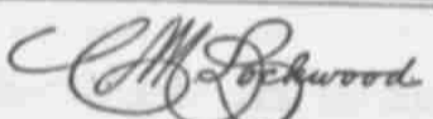
