School News

The city schools assembled Tuesday morning after the Christmas vacation. Little trouble was had anywhere in getting down to work again.

The high school met for the first time in session in the new building. The forenoon was spent in arranging the seating and other preliminary work. The school gathered in the assembly hall in good order and with little confusion. The desks are numbered up to 190, and the pupils arranged alphabetically as their names appear on the register. The girls occupy the division of seats on the North side of the hall, and the boys that on the south. The teachers have charts so arranged that they can tell from the platform whether any pupils are out of their places or absent at any time of the day.

Principal Mariatte spent a good portion of the morning explaining various rules that will be enforced in the new building. The following are extracts from his talk: "Marking shall depend on four things, viz: Quality of work, with respect to neatness and accuracy, tardiness, absence and general conduct. All excuses for tardiness must accompany the pupil at the time of tardiness. As soon as the new bell system is installed three bells shall regulate the class changes, a warning bell, a dismissal bell and a commencing bell, which shall be rung three minutes apart. In the assembly hall during study periods there shall be no talking. For whispering the pupil must deal with the principal. The third time sent to him brings suspension. One offense of not-writing shall equal two of whispering. Only one pupil will be allowed to leave the assembly room at one time, and for a time of five minutes; longer stay will constitute tardiness. Pupils may be at liberty in the assembly room during changes of classes. The roll will be taken by six student monitors, who shall at each morning and noon record the numbers of vacant seats and report them to the teacher in charge.

The names of the absentees will be written on the board located on the platform and all tardy are required to cross their names and write near it the extent of their tardiness. Truancy shall be punishable by expulsion. All pupils must be either in the assembly hall or in a class room. Pupils passing to class room must go through the north door; from class rooms through the south door. High school students shall not use the west stairways because they are for the grades."

The grade children were almost lost in the new building the first time, but settled down to work readily after finding their rooms. They will soon, however, become accustomed to the new conditions.

The principal of East school reports that everything started as nicely as could be desired, since the vacation. He had the building thoroughly cleaned from basement to garret. He reports several new students, but they have not enrolled yet.

The room that was formerly the principal's, and has for some time been occupied by the high school, Mr. Graham has had fitted up and seated with seventy desks. It will be used for a test room for several classes at once; and as a general assembly room for the seventh and eighth grades.

Mr. Graham has taken possession of the principal's office, and decorated it in a very cozy manner. He has also re-decorated his room with green and red ribbons of crepe paper, which gives it a very home like effect.

Mrs. Beal, the teacher of the 2A and 3B at East school, reports two return pupils, Harry Budlong, who has been sick with typhoid fever, and Omer Steel, who has been sick with scarlet fever.

The Demosthenes society had its regular meeting Tuesday, which was postponed a day on account of New Year. Twenty-eight members were present. After the usual order of business the society adopted a set of New Year resolutions that were drawn up and presented by Miss Meroe. The remainder of the time was spent in an amusing manner, listening to jokes and stories.

The two societies of the high school have a very commodious hall set apart for their meeting place. It is the room immediately west of the library, which is on the second floor directly opposite the main entrance. The room is of good size, furnished with tablet arm chairs and blackboards. The societies are indeed fortunate.

Several of the classes are too large for the present seating capacity, and more seats will be necessary.

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YERKES WAS A GAY OLD BIRD

A St. Paul dispatch says: It became known Monday for the first time that the late Charles T. Yerkes had one more wife than he had ever popularly been credited with. He had a romantic adventure in North Dakota 23 years ago, with a marriage as the distinguishing feature.

He was at Fargo in the summer of 1882, establishing a residence in order to secure a divorce. A beautiful young woman arrived at Valley City from Western New York, ostensibly to visit her sister, Mrs. Charles Sayles, wife of Dr. Sayles, a member of the general merchandise firm of Parkhurst & Sayles. At any rate, she was introduced by Mrs. Sayles as her sister.

At that time Mr. Yerkes renewed a former intimacy with Dr. Sayles. So great was this friendship that Mr. Yerkes built his friend a fine home and, it is understood, helped him financially.

From the day of Mr. Yerkes' first visit, which lasted several days, he and the young woman from New York were inseparable. In the fall Mr. Yerkes obtained his divorce and his marriage to the lovely young New Yorker followed quickly, and North Dakota knew them no more.

A year or two after this Dr. Sayles committed suicide on the banks of the Red River of the North, eight miles south of Fargo, because of domestic infidelity, and his widow and children returned to New York.

Mrs. Sayles Helped Lovers.

Then it was revealed that not the slightest relationship existed between Mrs. Sayles and her supposed sister, but that, knowing the situation between the lovers, she and the girl having been schoolmates in the East, Mrs. Sayles had consented to the deception at the instance of her husband and the girl friend. The parents of the young woman visitor, supposing their daughter was merely staying in North Dakota as the guest of her schoolmate, knew nothing of the romance till after the marriage with the traction magnate.

The true name of the young woman has never been revealed.

Foreigners in German Universities.

The various German newspapers have recently made reference to the mass meeting which the German students of the Jena University held on November 2, 1905. At this meeting the students drew up a petition, which was presented to the protector and senate of the university. They request that foreigners should not be per-

mitted to attend the recitations and lectures except as matriculated students, and then only on presentation of certificates proving that their preparatory education has been equal to that which is required of the German students. It is also recommended that foreign students should be obliged to pass an entrance examination in the German language, thus depriving German students of the necessary instructions. The German students also believe that they should have the advantage and privilege of being first assigned to the various halls and laboratories, and the foreign students assigned to the remaining vacant places two weeks after the opening of the term. Many of the foreign students, living too far away to return home during the vacation, have remained in the various university cities, and, consequently, they are the first to enter as the semester or term opens, and thus have a great advantage over those who enter later, the time of matriculation or enrollment extending over three to four weeks.

It is also suggested that the tuition fee for foreigners should be placed at a figure that will cover all expenses, so that the government will not be incumbered with extra expenses caused by their attendance. The forming of societies by foreign students should be prohibited, and restrictions must be made on the political and moral tendencies of foreign students, especially referring to such from Eastern European countries. Several years ago many of the German universities (Swiss universities also) tried the experiment of admitting females as students, and this privilege was quickly taken advantage of, especially by Russians. For various reasons these privileges have been curtailed or restricted entirely by some of the universities now. The Jena students are the first to petition in reference to these matters. It is anticipated that the students of other German universities will follow with similar petitions.—Consul Brittain at Kohl, Germany.

Private Canal for Standard Oil.

Sulphur, La., Jan. 3.—The work on the canal, which the Standard Oil company is going to build from here to the Sabine river, a distance of 17 miles, was begun today. The canal, which will form a junction with the Sabine river at or below Orange, will be used for the transportation of the sulphur and other products of the Union Sulphur company, which is a branch of the Standard Oil company. The canal is to be 30 feet wide at the bottom and is to have a minimum depth of six feet.
