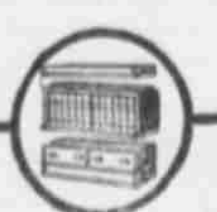

Render Two Decisions.

Attorney-General Crawford rendered
two opinions yesterday. In one he
holds that the state is not entitled to
50 per cent, nor any other part of the
net profits of the Lewis and Clark fair,
and in the other he holds that the state
board of medical examiners cannot re-
fuse to allow applicants taking exami-
nation before the board the privilege
of seeing their papers after they have
been examined.

In regard to the first, the attorney-
general holds that the state would not
have been responsible for any deficit
and hence there is no way in which the
state commission could come in for a
share of the profits.

The second opinion was rendered in
response to a query from Dr. Joseph,
chairman of the state board of exami-
ners, and is the climax of a controversy
which was started last spring, when the
board refused to allow some applicants
who had failed to pass to see their own
papers, after they had been corrected.
