New Army Law in France in Force.

Paris, Jan. 3.—The new army law, which was adopted by an overwhelming majority at the last session of the chamber of deputies, has gone into effect and, it is believed, will give general satisfaction. The new law reduces the term of active service in the army from three to two years. On the other hand it renders every Frenchman liable, and abolishes all former exceptions concerning widows' sons and bread winners. While such young men are serving in the army those dependent upon them will be assisted by the state. Men hitherto freed from military service will be enrolled in an auxiliary corps. It is maintained that this law will not decrease the numbers of the army on a peace footing, which is 550,000, but military experts are of the opinion that there will be a slight reduction, of about 25,000, because one half of the active army will be released annually, instead of one third as heretofore, and that the abolition of exemptions does not compensate for this.

The principle of the new law is all round equality. In carrying out this principle the pupils of cadet schools must serve one year in the ranks before beginning their studies, while students in the various professions, heretofore serving only twelve months, must henceforth serve one year as ordinary soldiers and then, on passing examinations, become reserve officers during the second year of their service.

DANISH HIGH SCHOOLS

The Danish "high school" was the outcome of a recent period in Danish history when the nation passed through a crucial period of trouble, loss and humiliation, when its language and even its nationality were threatened from without, and when it seemed for a time as if even the intellectual and spiritual independence might be destroyed or absorbed. During such periods when "the reproof of chance" lay heavy on one of the smaller nations, the true proof of its men and women was tested to its utmost, and Denmark at this crisis in its history was not found wanting. After the storm had passed and the province of Schleswig-Holstein had been wrested from the national Grotow and other patriots conceived and carried out the "high school" scheme, and succeeded finally in attracting to these schools all that was best and most aspirational in the life of the peasantry and people. The aim of the teacher was not so much to impart knowledge as to stimulate the reflective powers, so as to arouse in the minds of their pupils thoughts on the value and purpose of life.

With this object in view the founders of the scheme took into special consideration when choosing their teaching staff the personal qualities of the teacher, the amount of magnetism in his personality, so to speak, and placed these qualifications above those academic attainments. The warden or head of each school is the host and the head of the family gathered together under his roof; for the students board in his house during the school terms. As most of the students are drawn from the class of agricultural laborers and small farmers, the men take the winter term from November till April, and the women the summer term from May to August. The course is really a two years' one, but it is at the option of the pupils to attend for a term only. The inclusive cost for board and teaching is \$8.25 a month and the poorest of the students who cannot save enough to pay this sum or cannot afford to spend so much time away from their farms without pecuniary assistance, are helped by the state with about two-thirds of their expenses.—London Post.
