BARNES WAS TOO FRESH

Washington, Jan. 5.—The sympathies of the public on all sides with Mrs. Morris this morning. The woman is prostrated as a result of her rough treatment, and she is under the care of a physician. The President is said to have expressed great displeasure, and Barnes has already been asked to make an explanation to him. Barnes said he took the woman for one of a host of cranks, who were specially attracted to the White House. Friends of Mrs. Morris declare the perpetrators of what they call an outrage shall not go unpunished. Hull is reticent.

Barnes issued a statement in which he says "Mrs. Morris' piercing shrieks could be heard throughout the building. She refused to listen to his counsel of order. She struggled violently with the two police officers. Outside she threw herself on the ground, and it became necessary to carry her. He denies a negro messenger aided the officers."

His coming to Salem on Sunday next is an event of no little importance, and it is expected that large audiences will greet him at the Congregational church in the afternoon at 3, and at the Presbyterian church in the evening at 7:30.

Brigadier Jenkins has been connected with the Salvation Army work for the past twenty-three years, and has held many important posts in that service.

He is a speaker of great ability and is in demand as a platform orator at most of the great meetings of the army. His addresses show evidence of deep thought and careful preparation, and it is always a pleasure to hear him. It was Brigadier Jenkins who was selected to fill the place of Commander Eva Booth when that officer was unable to fill an appointment before a large Chicago audience.

The meetings on Sunday will be presided over by Mr. John Bayne, and the enthusiastic features of the Salvation Army meetings will not be omitted. Local musicians are to take a part in these services. During the afternoon meeting at the Congregational church, Mrs. Zadoc Riggs will sing a sacred solo, and at the evening meeting in the Presbyterian church there will be a duet by Miss Peebles and Mrs. F. A. Wiggins. All these singers are well known to Salem people, and will in themselves attract many.

The local work of the Salvation Army is in charge of two officers, and is in a very prosperous state. The attendance at the meetings is good, and the children's work is in a flourishing condition. During the past three months free beds have been supplied to 90 men. At Christmas, 33 basket dinners, each sufficient for four people, were distributed, and in three months over 300 garments have been supplied to needy people. In the same period 22 conversions have been reported.

DEAD DOWN IN THE MINE

Twenty One Killed by an Explosion in Virginia Coal Mine

Blue Fields, W. Va., Jan. 5.—It is definitely learned today that 21 were killed as the result of the fire damp explosion at Coaldale yesterday. Only one body, so far, has been recovered, the smoke and gas retarding the rescue parties.

Patrick Must Hang.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 5.—Governor Higgins announced today that he would deny the application for a reprieve for Albert T. Patrick, the lawyer who is confined in Sing Sing prison, under sentence to die January 23, for the murder of the aged millionaire, William Rhea. The application was made on Tuesday by ex-Senator William Lindsay, of Kentucky, who is practicing law in New York, and A. C. Shennstone, also of New York, who appeared in Patrick's case, owing to the illness of D. B. Hill. They asked Governor Higgins to grant a reprieve in Patrick's case to enable them to examine the 6000 pages of testimony taken on the trial in order to perfect an appeal to the United States supreme court.

The governor said today that his denial of the reprieve must not be interpreted as in any way foreshadowing what his action would be upon an application for executive clemency. He has written Patrick's attorneys, stating that, in view of the long period which has elapsed since Patrick's conviction, he is not satisfied that a further delay for the sole purpose of taking an appeal on technical grounds was in the interest of justice.

GAMBLER LOSES HIS ROLL

Held Up in Tacoma After Lucky Night at Cards.

Tacoma, Jan. 5.—"Keep still; don't make a move; all we want is your wad." That is what was said when two footpads stopped William Jett, a gambler, near the corner of South Fifteenth and C streets Thursday morning and relieved him of a little over \$400 in cash. When they had his money the thugs pointed their revolvers at Jett and motioned him to go on toward home at 1719 South D street.

According to the story told by Jett he had been in Georgetown all night and had been fairly lucky at cards. He returned on the train that gets into Tacoma about 5 o'clock, and was on his way home at the time of the robbery.

"I had just passed the Old Pal saloon," said Jett, "when I noticed two fellows ahead of me, sort of loitering along, and going in the same direction that I was. As I approached the fellows parted and I stepped forward rather fast to pass between them. As I came even with them they each grabbed an arm, and each shoved a gun into my face, saying: 'Keep still; don't make a move; all we want is your wad.'"

"I didn't put up any fight. They had the edge on me, all right, and I took their dope. They knew where I had my roll all right, for they went right to it, and never searched anywhere else. As soon as they had the money they gave me a push, and I went right on up the hill, knowing that they had me covered."

Light for the Statue of Liberty.

Washington, Jan. 5.—Congressman Joseph A. Goulden, representing the 18th congressional district of New York in the house of representatives, has acted in accordance with the wishes of a large number of New Yorkers when he introduced the bill asking for an appropriation of \$25,000 to be used in supplying an electrical equipment sufficient to adequately illuminate the Statue of Liberty by Bartholdi, which stands on Bedloe Island in New York harbor, and is supposed to illuminate that harbor by night. Ever since the government took over the statue in 1903, only \$3,500 a year has been allowed for the purpose of maintaining the light in the torch of the statue. The inadequacy of the light has been ridiculed by thousands of visitors, and for a long time there has been a strong sentiment in favor of adding in some way to the illumination, so as to make the outlines of the statue visible at night. As it is, the statue cannot be seen at night, excepting that part of the torch nearest the light.

Ferry Boat Lost.
