SHOULD NOW RESIGN.

Means Probably Condensed Food.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 5.—It has been decided by the naval authorities to equip the navy with the army emergency rations, and in the near future 6000 of these rations will be purchased for the use of landing parties and in the exercise of "abandon ship." The navy has never had an emergency ration of its own, but it is the wish of President Roosevelt that more work shall be done by landing parties, extending over several days. This, of course, requires some special provision in the way of food, and it is realized by the navy officers that nothing better can be obtained than the emergency rations which have stood the test of practical service in the field.
