THE GOSPEL OF SELF HELP

East Oregonian Interviews the Salem Journal Editor, on Practical Matters

The East Oregonian, Democratic in politics, but wide-awake, gives the following interview with the Salem Journal editor, as he passed through Pendleton on his way to the La Grande convention Tuesday. It says:

Col. E. Hofer, editor of the Salem Journal, president of the Willamette Valley Development League, and one of the most prominent promoters of the interests of Oregon, is in the city today on his way to attend the meeting of the Northwest Fruitgrowers' association at La Grande, where he is scheduled to address the convention on the subject of "Strawberries," upon which subject he is an expert.

Since Colonel Hofer is editor of one of the leading papers in the western part of the state, politics in general is closely watched by him. While he seeks no office, and is promoting the interests of no candidate, yet he intimately familiar with every phase of the situation in the state, and talks entertainingly upon the subject.

said Colonel Hofer to the East Oregonian today. "Western Oregon has cut loose from old factional interests and demands, and will be satisfied with nothing less than an absolutely new and square deal throughout."

"Western Oregon will nominate nothing but clean, fearless, virile men, fresh from the ranks of the people for public office. She invites Eastern Oregon to do the same, and then both sections of the state should stand together and elect this class of men, and both sections will secure justice due them."

"The very development of the state depends upon the election of new and clean men, and in the abandonment of the old political fight. Capital will be encouraged by a new deal, the state will be reinstated in the public esteem from which it has been rudely torn by the corrupt politics in the past, and Western Oregon is determined on having a new deal."

People Should Elect Senator.

"There is one supreme and vital issue upon which this state should express itself in no uncertain terms, and that is for the people to elect a candidate for the United States senate who is a man of the people, and not a millionaire politician, with no other qualification—and then this candidate should be chosen by the legislature to show the voice of the people, and not the money bag, still rules the state."

"Oregon can set a precedent in this matter, and by this one popular and progressive act sweep out of existence the national snitch which has been placed upon the state by corrupt and mercenary politics."

"Western Oregon stands for this principle. She demands a man of the people for the senate, and will stand with Eastern Oregon to the last ditch for a man of this caliber, regardless of his millions or his political pull. Merit, honesty, common sense, democratic spirit and efficiency must be the qualifications upon which the people's candidate for the senate should stand, and upon these qualifications the legislature can safely elect."

"The state is just now on the eve of her greatest industrial era. The selection of clean, new, untrammeled men for public office will hasten and encourage the opening of the era. It will invite capital, and will induce good citizenship to seek homes here, and to this end the entire state should labor."

"A continuation of the old political factional fight and the division of offices among the old rings will be detrimental to the state. What we want, and what Western Oregon is determined to have, is the new deal which has been long in coming."

VERDICT D-----D OUTRAGE

Thus Characterized by the Convicted Chicago Capitalist and Speculator

"It is a D-----D outrage," declared A. T. Kellier yesterday afternoon in speaking of the verdict which had just been brought in against him. He repeated the statement, that he had made many times before, that he was as innocent of the crime with which he was charged as any man could be. He never expected to be convicted, and was the most surprised man in the court room when the verdict was read. He is still hopeful and expects to win in the supreme court, for he says that surely justice will not be denied a man entirely. While chagrined over the verdict, he takes it very philosophically and says that he does not care so much for himself as he does for his wife's account.

In giving his charge to the jury the judge stated that it was now the duty of the jury to say whether or not, according to the testimony given, the charges were true as preferred against Kellier in the information. He said that Turner must be viewed in the light of an accomplice, and that conviction could not be had upon his testimony alone, but that it must be supported by other testimony. He said that there had been other testimony introduced to substantiate Turner, which must be considered but concerning the value of which the jury must be the sole judge. He read citations from the code, to show that it was not necessary for Kellier to have been present when the name was forged, if it had been forged, but that all it was necessary to show was that he was aiding and abetting in the forgery.

The jury had been out about two hours and a half, when they asked for further instructions. They were brought back into the room and in answer to questions were told that to be guilty of forgery, Kellier must have known before hand that the name G. L. Bies was to have been signed to an application and to the certificate of sale, and that if after it was done he should be informed that it was a forged name and yet went on to adopt it, that he would not be guilty of forgery.

About fifteen minutes after they had retired for the second time, or nearly three hours after they had retired the first time, they filed into the court room and handed their verdict to the judge, who gave it to the clerk, who read, "guilty as charged."

The rest was mere formality. The judge fixed next Monday at 9 o'clock as the time for pronouncing sentence, and at that time there will be filed and argued a motion for a new trial. As it is probable that the court will not pass on the motion for a new trial the same day that it is argued, it may be late in the week before sentence is finally pronounced. After the last instructions had been given to the jury, the attorneys for the defense fully expected a verdict for acquittal and now say that if they are denied a new trial by Judge Burnett, that the supreme court will surely give them a rehearing.

The Price of Crime.

The penalty for the crime for which Kellier has been convicted is imprisonment for from two to twenty years.
