TO HONOR  
HUDSON'S  
MEMORY

New York, Jan. 5.—Francis Bannerman, a member of the American Scenic and Historic Preservation society, has made an offer to the committee in charge of the arrangements for the big celebrations to be held here in honor of the 300th anniversary of the voyage of Henry Hudson up the river which bears his name, and it is quite possible that the proposition will be accepted. Mr. Bannerman has offered to erect, at his own expense, on Polo's island, in Newburg bay, a monumental bronze statue of Hudson, upon a stone pedestal, the whole to be about 70 feet high. Many other suggestions have been made, among them to widen Fifth avenue between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, and create a large public square, in the center of which a Hudson Column, similar to the Vandome Column in Paris and Trafalgar Column in London, shall be erected. The committee in charge of the preparations for the Ter-Centennial celebration, is hard at work sifting the material in its hands and selecting a suitable method of honoring the memory of the great explorer in a worthy and dignified manner.

STANDARD  
OIL INVESTIGATIONS

New York, Jan. 5.—Representatives of the state of Missouri and of the Standard Oil company appeared before Commissioner Henry Wollman this morning, when the case of the state of Missouri against the Standard Oil company, for alleged violations of the anti-trust laws was called for a hearing. Attorney General Hadley of Missouri and several assistants represented the state of Missouri, while the Standard Oil company was represented by an imposing array of legal talent. Among those present were Henry H. Rogers, James A. Moffatt of the executive committee of the company, Frank Q. Barstow, and Howard Page. In all 21 directors and officials of the Standard Oil company have been summoned to appear as witnesses.

## Iowa Agricultural Union.

Ames, Ia., Jan. 5.—The annual meeting of the Iowa Agricultural Union opened at the Iowa State Agricultural College this morning with a large attendance. Many prominent alumni of the college and others interested in the agricultural development of the state are in attendance. The meeting will be highly interesting, as reports on the experimental work carried on by the members of the organization will be submitted. Several professors of the college will speak at the banquet tonight.

## After Standard Oil.

New York, Jan. 5.—The fight of Governor Folk to drive the Standard Oil Company from Missouri was resumed in this city today. Officials were called before Commissioner Sandborn to give testimony in two suits brought by Attorney-General Hamley, in the Missouri courts.

NATIONAL  
GUARDS-  
MEN MEET

Washington, D. C., Jan. 5.—The national capital has been invaded by representatives of the militia of the various states, who have come here to attend the annual convention of the Interstate National Guard Association. The session was opened this morning by the president of the association, General Charles Dick, of Ohio. Many prominent National Guard officers are in attendance, among them General G. Moulton, of Illinois; Colonel F. D. Evans, Nebraska; General John D. Frost, South Carolina; General N. H. Henry, New York; General F. J. Stewart, Pennsylvania; General William Steppford, Massachusetts; General C. B. Foster, Virginia; General L. Bigge, Maryland; General Armistead, North Carolina; and many others. After the president had read his annual report and the other officers had submitted their reports for the year, a number of interesting papers on military subjects were read by several distinguished officers of the United States army, who had an opportunity to observe the late Japanese-Russian war at close range. Among the papers were some on the efficiency of various arms, powders, etc., on improvements in the signal service, and on various matters. The convention will last until January 22nd.

## Diamond State Poultry Exhibition.

Wilmington, Del., Jan. 5.—The annual poultry show given under the auspices of the Diamond State Poultry association, was opened today at Turner hall. The number of entries is unusually large and the quality of the exhibits superior to that in former years. Many prominent fanciers and breeders in other states have donated premiums and prizes for this exhibition and there is a strong competition in several of the most important classes, particularly in pigeons. J. D. Neviss of Philadelphia and R. G. Bailey of Newark, N. J., are the judges in the poultry classes, while Joseph Thompson of Camden, N. J., is the judge for pigeons. The attendance at the opening was very large and great deal of interest was manifested.

## 'Struck by Limb.

Ashland, Or., Jan. 5.—M. L. Hicks, a resident of Ashland, aged 67 years was accidentally struck on the head by a falling limb, while getting wood in Ashland canyon Wednesday, suffering injuries from which he died this morning. His son was pitching limbs down a mountain side when a limb striking a tree, devastated so as to hit Hicks, who was standing below at the side of the chute.
