MUST

Washington, Jan. 8.—Representative Sheppard, of Texas, introduced a resolution in the house calling for an investigation by a committee of what he termed the "recent violent expulsion of an American mother from the White House offices, while seeking an audience with the President."

The supreme court has decided that Armour & Company must pay a license of \$100 in each county in North Carolina, imposed by the state law upon beef packers doing business there. Armour sought to evade the payment on the grounds that the license was a tax upon interstate commerce.

In the Standard oil cases the witnesses testified concerning subsidiary companies and the instructions they had received, as employees, not to divulge the fact that they were, or ever had been connected with Standard. H. C. Hardcastle, a former employee of the Standard says officials of the Republic Company instructed employees to represent themselves as independent of the Standard.

The Gentry Murder.
Chicago, Jan. 8.—In pursuit of clues to the murder of Mrs. A. W. Gentry, the police this morning arrested James Goodelman, a cab man, who says he took a man answering the description of Frank J. Constantine to two railroad stations, and thence to a pawn shop, thence to the Sherman house, where he left him, Saturday, shortly after the time of the murder.

OHIO'S
DEMOCRATIC
GOVERNOR

The poultry industry in this state has received a decided boost recently by reason of the fact that the United States census showed that poultry raising is more profitable per acre than any other form of agriculture. To still further encourage the development of this valuable industry, the Denver chamber of commerce has decided to offer three silver loving cups in addition to the regular prizes offered for the most meritorious exhibits.

THE WAGES
OF SIN
IS DEATH

In the presence of her husband, who has traveled almost across the continent to persuade his wife to return to her home, after a wayward life of two years in a notorious dive, Mrs. Eva Toy committed suicide by taking carbolic acid at Fourth and Davis streets shortly after 3 o'clock yesterday morning.

Efforts of a physician to save her life were unavailing, and the woman died in the sight of her husband, who would have taken her back to her home, notwithstanding her past life. Mrs. Toy left a comfortable home in St. Paul two years ago, leaving no word behind her. Her disappearance was a mystery until last summer when a friend of Toy, visiting the Lewis and Clark exposition, saw the woman here, and located her in the North End. On his return to St. Paul he notified Toy of his wife's whereabouts, but he left him in darkness as to her mode of life. Toy is a railroad engineer, and, as soon as he was able to get leave of absence, came to Portland. He had considerable difficulty in finding his wife. As he was entering the room of the woman yesterday morning she tipped a two-ounce bottle of carbolic acid to her mouth, and swallowed the burning poison before she could be prevented.

Washington, Jan. 8.—The President sent a communication this afternoon praising the work of the canal commission and denouncing its detractors. He says the work is being admirably done, and great progress has been made the last nine months. He says what has been done gives reason to believe the canal will be accomplished sooner than anticipated. He says every charge of jobbery, inefficiency and immorality, from whatever source it comes, has been investigated and found false.

Poultry Exhibition at Augusta.

Augusta, Ga., Jan. 8.—The annual exhibition under the auspices of the Augusta Poultry and Pet Stock club opened today at the Miller Walker hall with a large attendance. The number of entries is unusually large and the quality superior to that in former years. Many valuable prizes have been offered for the best exhibits in the various classes and there is strong rivalry between the exhibitors. The exhibition will remain open until Friday, and it is expected that it will draw thousands of visitors from all parts of the state to this city. On the last day of the exhibition the Augusta Poultry and Pet Stock club will hold its regular meeting. Dr. Stephen D. Lee, of Hodges, N. C., is acting judge at the exhibition and will be assisted by Dr. W. C. Checkley of this city, who is also considered an expert in his line.

More Irrigation Troubles.

The state board is holding a meeting this afternoon to consider the adoption of rules for the Columbia Southern Irrigation Company. The meeting is being held behind closed doors. President Laidlaw, of the Irrigation Company, and a representative of the Water Users' Association are present. The same questions are involved in this case as created so much trouble and came near wrecking the Deschutes Irrigation Company, but Mr. Laidlaw is determined that nothing shall be given out to the public until it is all settled. Reports from Eastern Oregon state that the company does not have nearly water sufficient to irrigate the land they claim to have reclaimed.

UNION
LABOR
CITY

San Francisco, Jan. 8.—For the first time in the history of any large American city, San Francisco today commences a two-years' administration under a complete union labor administration. Absolutely every city and county office, and all appointments thereunder, from the commissioners to the janitors are union labor men or union labor sympathizers. This is Mayor Schmidt's third term, upon which he entered at noon, when he presented his annual message, in which he made a bitter attack upon those newspapers that opposed his re-election, and in which he favored a city water supply, the operation of the Geary street railroads by the city, new schools, improvements in the streets, sewers, etc.

Wants Ship Subsidy.

Washington, Jan. 8.—Senator Gallinger, of New Hampshire, chairman of the merchant marine commission addressed the senate today in opening the debate on the shipping bill, which was favorably reported to the senate from the committee on commerce. Gallinger deplored the inadequate steamship service, especially to South America, and urged proper encouragement of the merchant marine.

Dairy School and Exhibition.

Madison, Wis., Jan. 8.—The fifth annual convention of the Wisconsin Buttermakers' association opened here this morning at the auditorium of the new agricultural building. In connection with the meeting a dairy exhibition was also opened and a dairy school inaugurated. The premium fund is larger this year than in former years and there is the liveliest competition between the exhibitors of butter and other dairy products. The standard for admission of products to this exhibition is quite high; the minimum being 90 per cent.

NO PLACE FOR FUGITIVES.

Fashionable New York Hotels Are Barred to New Fictitious Champions.

New York, Jan. 8.—Barred from three fashionable hotels, the Waldorf, Astoria, the Hotel Astor and the St. Regis, and requested to leave a fourth where he had engaged luxurious quarters under his real name, "Philadelphia Jack" O'Brien, the gladiator of 149 ring battles, went to bed tonight as Joseph F. Hagan, the whilom guest of the Hotel Netherlands, with a greater bitterness than he had ever before known in his heart.

Germany Is Arming.

Geneva, Switzerland, Jan. 8.—Germany for several days has been increasing her forces on the Swiss and French frontiers. Garrisons are on a war footing, and big guns are being mounted.

STANDARD
OIL'S OLD
METHODS

New York, Jan. 8.—Attorney-general Hadley, of Missouri, stated this morning that Wade Hampton, auditor of the Standard, had failed to appear, and says he is ill. Mrs. Butts, Rice's step-daughter, was recalled and told of the Rice suits against the Standard.

Hardcastle said he was asked to resign and give up the correspondence which he had with the Republic and Standard. He asked for an outside position, and was told he could never get a better position if he did not give up the letters. He was offered a ticket abroad, without a return coupon. H. H. Rogers was called. A photographer set off a flashlight, without warning. Everybody in the room, except Rogers, jumped. He sat still, and smiled. Rogers has frequently asked for a private hearing, because he said he was nervous.

New York, Jan. 8.—One of the counsel for the Standard today declared Folk and Hadley were whipping each other over the Standard's head, and that the present suits were mere policy plays. Hadley's friends declare the statement as one of the Standard's tricks, and emphatically state that Hadley and Folk are working harmoniously.

TOOK
SUICIDE
ROUTE

New York, Jan. 8.—Charles M. Meir, formerly a trusted employee of a San Francisco wine merchant, wanted there on the charge of embezzlement of \$20,000, committed suicide this morning, aboard the liner Carmania, as the vessel was entering this port from Liverpool. Meir was arrested in London on November 8th, at the request of the state department, who ordered his extradition. Detective Reynolds was sent to London, and had the prisoner in charge when he killed himself.

The police freely predicted that Reynolds would not succeed in bringing back his prisoner, and that the latter would commit suicide. Meir embezzled about \$20,000 from John Caffey, Pacific coast agent of the Pomeroy Wine Company, of New York, while employed as confidential manager and bookkeeper. September 24th Meir mysteriously disappeared. Caffey reported to the police that Meir had been missing for nearly a week, and feared he had met foul play. He didn't suspect Meir of being short in his accounts, and did not examine his books until October 1st, when he found that Meir was short \$20,000. He was traced to Galveston, Texas, and from there to Germany and London by Detective Gibson.

The arrest of Meir has caused a great sensation here. Many persons believe that he murdered both women, and that, after having committed the crime, he set fire to the house, in the hope of destroying both bodies. The state is said to be prepared to make a very strong case against him.
