California Building Trades Council. San Jose, Cal., Jan. 8.—The State Building Trades Council of California opened its fifth annual convention in agates' Hall this morning with about 500 delegates, representing the various organizations in every part of the state, in attendance. The convention was opened by General President P. H. McCarthy of San Francisco. The delegates of San Jose delivered an address of welcome and the president responded. Then the president read his annual address and was followed by the other officers of the organization, who submitted their annual reports. The State Building Trades Council has gained largely in membership during the past year. Several new councils have become affiliated, among them the Building Trades Council of

Fresno county, the Building Trades Council of Marin county, and the Building Trades Council of San Diego county. The gain in membership has been over 25 per cent.

The convention this year is of unusual importance owing to the fact that a great many vital questions will come up for consideration and discussion. Questions of jurisdiction will undoubtedly, take up considerable time of the convention. Recommendations will be made and legislation enacted whereby it is hoped that the frequent and aggravating trade disputes between organizations may in the future be largely eliminated. The plan, so successfully pursued by the Building Trades Council in adjusting frictions of this kind between the unions will, in all probability, be adopted by all the councils on recommendation of the state body. The question of perfecting and extending the organization will also receive the careful attention of the convention, and, if it is possible, to excel the remarkable record made by the council during the year 1905 plans will be laid and efforts made to do so the coming year.

London, Jan. 9.—The famous Leeds chorus of 250 vocalists, and considered one of the finest bodies of singers in the world, started today for Paris to sing at the London orchestra concerts to be given in that city during the present season. The committee in charge of the enterprise will pay railway and turbine steamer expenses from Leeds to Paris and return and all hotel expenses in Paris for all the singers and the reserves. The latter are necessary, owing to the strict rules and high standards of the chorus. Any singer who misses a rehearsal becomes disqualified and the vacancy is at once filled from a list of eligible reserves, who invariably attend the rehearsals in the hope of being included in the regular chorus.

STATE NEWS

Fred Long, of Corvallis, who was employed at a sawmill, near Eugene, was accidentally killed Saturday by two logs rolling over his body and crushing his hips in a terrible manner.

Samuel Geer died at the home of his son, Levi Geer, at London, Lane county, Oregon, last week. He was one of the sturdy pioneers of Lane county and settled in Oregon in 1864.

Joseph Provost, the Eugene painter, who was arrested at that place several weeks ago, for breaking into a saloon, was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary by Judge Harris Saturday.

It is feared that she will not recover.
